

enough to keep his ardent temperament at work. We have annexed part of the Sikkim territory as a punishment for the Rajah's late folly, and his annual revenue will be cut off by more than £2000.

The Polish and Hungarian refugees are being sent to Kutahia, in Asia, where, it is stated, they are to be detained for five years under strict surveillance. The Russians still occupy the Danubian principalities with their troops, and great activity prevails at the arsenals of Sebastopol.

We have not space to enter into the details of intrigues going on in Germany, but the conduct of M. Radowitz, in pursuing the scheme of German unity at the risk of breaking up the whole of the present German confederation and plunging the several States into a bootless war, is more than ever condemned; and as we long ago feared, Russia grows tired of looking quietly on the Danish quarrel in which she is so much interested, and her language becomes more decided. We look with increased alarm at the state of all Germany. The insurrection in Borna seems to be gaining ground, and a Turkish force of 2000 men has been defeated, and compelled to evacuate the fortress of Banjaluka.

The English coast was visited by a severe hurricane on the 30th March, causing much destruction of property and a frightful loss of life. The steamer Royal Adelaide from Cork to London, was lost on the Tongue Sand, at 11, p. m., and every soul on board (206 in number), was drowned. Of the passengers, 144 adults and 26 children were from Cork, and 14 from Plymouth. There were 25 of a crew, including the captain. The wreck has since been nearly washed away.

TRADE.—There has not been any particular change in business affairs during the week; and, with the exception of a few articles, influenced by causes peculiar to themselves, the dullness which has for so many weeks been prevalent, continues without much, if any, interruption. The Grain trade is again dull.

LATEST INTELLIGENCE.

FRANCE.—Paris, April 4.—The disgraceful scene in the Assembly yesterday, the insulting of the President of the Republic on his way to Vincennes, and the prospect of another election for Paris, have a depressing influence on the Funds. Not the slightest fear of any disturbance in the capital is, however, entertained. Emile de Girardin has been rejected as a candidate for Paris, at a preparatory Socialist meeting. Eugene Sue's name is mentioned with some chance of success, should he consent to come forward. Letters from Switzerland state that all apprehension of the refugees causing any disturbance has vanished.

The French Government has just received the serious intelligence that one of the regiments in garrison in Paris has revolted against its officers. It appears that the Colonel having two days ago intimated his intention to punish an adjutant who voted for the Democratic candidate at the last election, the great agitation manifested itself in the regiment. The soldiers refused to obey their officers, and set their authority at defiance. They left the barracks in bands, and since yesterday have been wandering in the suburbs, behaving in a very disorderly manner. All attempts to bring them back have proved ineffectual. It is said that Theodore Bac, a Montagnard, is to bring the question before the Assembly in the form of a question. The newspapers are filled with accounts of sergeants and corporals who have been reduced to the ranks and sent to Algeria for voting for the Socialists.

SPAIN.—Madrid, March 30.—The reports of approaching reconciliation with England are confirmed. The state of Cuba causes the greatest uneasiness: Spanish rule there is most precarious.

IRELAND.—A partial revival of the Repeal agitation in Ireland, under the auspices of John O'Connell, is said to have taken place: Emigration was on the increase.

The French Government is said to have received despatches from Germany, which lead to the belief that a collision between Austria and Prussia, is almost unavoidable, the language used by both powers partaking more and more of a hostile character.

THE GULF FISHERIES.—We alluded some time ago to a project in contemplation by one of our leading mercantile establishments to embark in the deep-sea fisheries. We have now to announce that the brigantine Sarah, 116 tons, Johnston, master, cleared yesterday at the Custom House on a fishing voyage in the Gulf of St. Lawrence and the coast of Labrador, fitted out by Messrs R. Rankin & Co. of this city. As they have been at a very heavy expense in this undertaking, the stores

and supplies of the vessel amounting to £350, we trust it will prove successful to the parties interested, and thereby introduce a new trade into the Province, the advantages attending which are clearly laid down in Mr Perley's report on the Fisheries, which was laid before the Legislature the present session.—Courier.

The Hon. W. H. Merritt, President of the Executive Council, has accepted the office of Chief Commissioner of Public Works, in Canada.

LEGISLATURE.—The Courier of Saturday reports that the Committee of Supply, it was expected, would finish the business before it on Friday, and that the Session of the Legislature would be brought to a close some time this week.

THE HALIFAX AND QUEBEC RAILWAY.—We have been kindly handed the following extract from a letter, which was received by John M. Johnson, Esq., from the Hon. A. Rankin, dated Fredericton 16th April, shewing the action of the House on the Petition from this quarter, praying for an act of Incorporation, for the Quebec, New Brunswick, and Halifax Railway Company:

"Your valued favor of the 10th inst. came duly to hand, the Petition therein contained attended to immediately, and the Railway Bill passed in the Committee without further amendment, than the confining its limits to Quebec on the one hand, and Halifax on the other, without either the Fredericton or Shediac branches; but on its third reading this morning, the second section, granting 10 miles of land on each side the line, and the £20,000 per annum towards payment of interest, was opposed, and the reconsideration of the facility clause moved and carried, which, at this advanced period of the Session, will, I fear, give this important measure the go-by for a season. In the series of Resolutions moved by Mr Parlow that object forms a leading feature, and on which an Address to the Throne will be predicated."

Northumberland Agricultural Society.

At a Meeting of the Board of the Northumberland Agricultural Society, held on TUESDAY, the 11th April, 1850, the following Regulations and Restrictions, respecting the erection of a Carding, Felling and Dressing Machine, for which the Society has offered a Premium of £50, were unanimously adopted:

"The object of the Society being to aid in the establishment of useful machinery in a convenient place in the Parish of Chatham or Newcastle, for the Carding, Felling, and Dressing the Wool and Cloth produced and made in the County, they will require parties competing for the Premium to provide suitable Buildings, and the necessary Machinery, on the most recent and most approved principles, for Carding, Felling, and Dressing Wool and Cloth, and on such a scale as will be suitable for the wants of this County at least; to which the Society is desirous that Dyeing should be added. The whole establishment to be completed, and in successful and efficient operation, and answering the purposes for which it is required, on or before the first day of September, 1851.

"The competitors for the Premium to send their applications to the Secretary on or before the first day of June next, stating the size and description of the buildings, the different descriptions of machinery they intend and will agree to provide and put in operation by the time limited, and the situation where the establishment is intended to be placed. The Board will determine to which of the applicants the premium shall be given.
