"The object of the Society being to aid in the establishment of useful machinery in a convenient place in the Parish of Chathem

convenient place in the Parish of Chatham or Newcastle, for the Carding, Fulling, and Dressing the Wool and Cloth produced and made in the County, they will require parties competing for the Premium to provide suitable produced. ble Buildings, and the necessary Machinery, on the most recent and most approved princion the most recent and most approved principles, for Carding, Fulling, and Dressing Wool and Cloth, and on such a scele as will be suitable for the wants of this County at least; to which the Society is desirous that Dyeing should be added. The whole establishment to be completed, and in successful and efficient operation, and answering the purposes for which it is required, on or before the first day of September, 1851.
