ROBERT PURDEN was found guilty of Forgery at our Supreme Court, and sentenced to Five Years imprisonment in the Provincial Penitentiary. He left here on Wednesday last in charge of the High Sheriff.

EUROPEAN NEWS.—Arrival of the Pacific. —The Shortest Passage Yet.—The American Steam Packet Pacific arrived at her wharf in New York at a quarter to seven o'clock on Saturday evening last. She left Liverpool at 2 p. m. on the 11th inst., and has therefore made the passage in ten days and five hours! This is stated to be eleven hours quicker than any other American Steamer, and eighteen hours quicker than any British Steamer ever made the run from Liverpool to New York.

General Haynau.—After the rescue of this noted character by the police, he was confined to bed at his hotel during the day. On Friday he was visited by a number of the Austrian nobles and others resident in London: and in order to avoid the recurrence of display of feeling similar to what took place at the Perkins & Co's. brewery, arrangements were made for his leaving England, and in the course of Friday night he took his departure.

The butcher Haynau has arrived at Aix-la-Chapelle, suffering from the severe flogging he received from the London draymen. He escaped from London, sneaked out of England and was allowed to pass through Belgium with silent contempt.

The steamer Niagara, arrived at Liverpool on the 9th.

The English money market presents no new feature.

FROM CALIFORNIA.—On the 14th of August, a dreadful riot, attended with loss of life, occurred at Sacramento City, between a body of people known as the Squatters and the Real Estate owners. It is well known that for some time past much ill feeling has prevailed between these two classes, and it has now found vent in an open warfare, the slaying of many persons, and the burning down of the city.

The outbreak commenced on Wednesday, August 14, when an armed body of about 60 Squatters were proceeding to the prison ship to release two of their party, who were confined on board. They were confronted by Mayor Bigelow, and members of the corporation. An affray soon commenced, and the city was aroused to arms. Mayor Bigelow was shot in three places and died in fifteen minutes after. J. W. Woodland, city Assessor, was shot dead, and several other citizens were killed and many severely wounded.

Dr. Robinson and a man named Mahoney, two leaders of the squatters, were shot dead as were also several of the same party.

The squatter force soon swelled from the sixty first engaged in the affray to a body of armed men numbering between seven and eight hundred. The keepers of gaming houses and sporting men generally sided with the real estate owner or citizens proper. A tremendous force was fast accumulating.

UNITED STATES.—A movement has been made by some Englishmen in New York, towards raising a sum of money for the purpose of making a complimentary present to the operatives employed in the Brewery of Barclay, Perkins & Co., London as a testimonial of approval for the reception given to General Haynau.

Jenny Lind's sixth and last concert for the present at New York, on Tuesday evening, was attended by 9090 persons. She would arrive in Boston on Thursday, and give her first concert in the Tremont Temple on Friday evening. The sale of tickets for the concert of seats took place on Wednesday. The first choice of a single seat was purchased, a good deal of competition, by E. O. Dodge, vocalist, for \$625; the second by Mr Hale, artist, for \$24. Among the bidders for the choice seat, we notice the name of Mr Ferridge, bookseller, who offered \$425 and his hat. The gross proceeds of the sale it was expected, would amount to \$16,000.

UNITED STATES.—Distressing Accident.—We learn from the Eastport Sentinel, that Bradford Olmore, his son Henry Olmore, 21; his brother Henry Olmore, Leonard Cook, and James Olmore, of Cutler, Maine, recently left for Haycock's harbor, for the purpose of driving herring. Not succeeding in finding any, they set out on their return home in the night, and arrived to within a hundred yards of their houses, when their boat was upset by the sea. They all succeeded in getting on her, but were repeatedly washed off, and sad to relate, all were drowned except Bradford Olmore.—St. John Brunswick.

Arrival of the Niagara.—We learn by telegraph, that the British Mail Steamer Niagara, which left Liverpool three days after the Pacific, arrived at New York yesterday morning, being her thirteenth day out. This is the first of the Cunard line that has gone direct to New York. The change in the route does not appear to have shortened the passage.—St. John Courier.

Startling Disclosures.—New York, Sept. 24.—A serious and startling affair came to light

yesterday at Morrisania, above Harlem, the substance of which is that some one hundred and thirty children, belonging to a founding institution there, have been made away with in some manner unknown. A number of bodies have been found buried. Suspicion rests on Miss Shotwell, the keeper of the establishment, but she has not yet been arrested.

An alteration having been made in the route of the British Contract Packets, on the line between Liverpool and New York, under which those packets will cease to call at Halifax both on the outward and homeward voyage, commencing with the Packet which left Liverpool on the 14th inst, and with the packet to leave New York on the 25th instant. Notice is hereby given that LETTERS and NEWSPAPERS for the United Kingdom, will be forwarded, in closed mails, by the New York line of mail packets if specially addressed 'via New York,' or 'via the United States.' Letters and Newspapers not so addressed, will be forwarded in the regular mails by the Contract Packets proceeding from Boston to Liverpool via Halifax.

Letters from the United Kingdom, directed to be forwarded through the United States, will be liable to a postage of 1s. 2d., Sterling, the half ounce, and Newspapers will be liable to an United States transit rate of One Penny Currency. The postage upon Letters may be paid in advance, or not, at the option of the sender; but upon Newspapers the postage will be paid on delivery, whether in the United States or in New Brunswick.

Until further Notice, the Mails to meet the sailing of the British Contract Packets from New York, will therefore be closed at this Office every other Wednesday Evening at Six o'clock, commencing with this evening.

Under the new Scheme of the Royal Mail Steam Packet Company, it is arranged that the Vessels of that Company shall no longer touch at Bermuda, either on the outward or the homeward voyage. The communication between the West Indies and America being thus cut off, there exist no means of forwarding Correspondence between the North American and West Indian Colonies, except by Packet-ship or by Packet via England.

PLOUGHING MATCH

The PLOUGHING MATCH of the Northumberland Agricultural Society, for the current year, will take place at DOUGLASTOWN, a short distance below the Residence of the Hon. Alexander Rankin, on THURSDAY, the THIRD day of OCTOBER next.

RULES AND REGULATIONS.

1. Teams must be on the ground by 9, and be ready to commence at 10 o'clock precisely.

2. All persons who may have gained the first prize for two years shall not be eligible to compete this year.

3. Three judges to be appointed by the Board of Directors, and their names to be announced by the Secretary on the morning of competition. They shall not, however, appear on the field of competition till the work be completed.

4. The Society will provide for the expense of ferrying all horses that have been actually engaged in the competition of the day.

5. The dimensions of the Furrow to be four and a half inches by eight inches.

CATTLE SHOW.

The CATTLE SHOW will take place on the same day and near the same place as the Ploughing Match.

The undermentioned premiums will be competed for by Members of the Society, under the following Rules and Regulations:

RULES AND REGULATIONS.

1. All Cattle and Horses must be on the ground and ready to enter for competition by 11 o'clock, A. M., and none shall be entered after 12 o'clock, noon.

2. To render any animal eligible for competition, the only conditions shall be, that the owner or exhibitor enter into arrangements, that if successful, he will keep his animal in the county at least 12 months after the day of competition; and that he be prepared to prove by certificate the breed and age of said animal.

3. That three Judges be appointed on the morning of the show, and their names announced by the secretary.

4. That the decision of any two Judges shall be final, and that in all cases, whether there be any competition or not, it shall be in the power of the Judges to withhold a premium, if they deem the object exhibited, unworthy of it.

5. The ferrings of all Cattle, entered for competition, having to cross the River, will be provided for by the Society.

The furrows shall be according to the dimensions decided on by the Judges. The work done must be considered superior, in order to entitle it to the award of a prize. Ploughmen shall be their own drivers, and must be members of the Society, or the usual Ploughmen of members.

CATTLE SHOW.

1. No animal having already obtained a Prize, allowed to compete in the same class
2. The competition shall be restricted to Cattle raised in the County.
3. No person shall receive more than one Prize of the same class
4. All Animals exhibited shall have been the property of the exhibitor for the space of at least three months previous to the Exhibition.
5. Stock intended for competition must be on the ground by 10 o'clock, A. M., on the day of the Show.
6. All animals must be provided with ropes or halters to tie them, in order to be allowed to compete.
