Hogs, Goats, Neat Cattle, &c. ATTENTION!

We, the Subscribers, having been appointed Hogreves for the Parish of Chatham, have, at the request of a number of friends and neighbors, qualified themselves, and intend faithfully to discharge the duties of the office in conformity with the solemn oath we have taken.

As we do not wish to take delinquents by surprise, we publish below a few extracts from the Regulations of the Sessions respecting Cattle, &c., going at large, for their information.

We hereby notify the public, that on FRIDAY next we will commence our labors, whether they be those of love, we will not pretend to say, but it will be unanimously admitted they are those of necessity. In discharging this onerous duty we trust our Animal propensities will not be brought into requisition, for although we do not wish to comport ourselves Hog-ishly, we have made up our minds to act Cal-gorically—to be Dog-ed in the discharge of our important trust—and to Ferret out all delinquents. Rest assured, then, that all hogs, goats, cattle, &c., going at large after the day above named, will be Impounded, and the Fines most strictly enforced. But when we can find owner for them, we shall not put ourselves to that trouble, but sue the parties before a Magistrate. We give this timely caution, in the hope it will be heeded, —if it be not, delinquents may rest assured we shall speedily be into their Pockets, or their hogs, &c., into the Pound. Reform is now the order of the day; and as to the practice of Hogs, Goats, Sheep, Bulls, Neat Cattle, Horses, &c., &c., roaming at large, to the sad annoyance of almost every person, and the destruction of much that is valuable and ornamental, we intend, to use the words of Hamlet "To REFORM it altogether." If we do not the fault will not be ours.

REGULATIONS. That in the Parishes of Newcastle and Chatham, Nelson, Northesk, Blackville, and Ludlow, no Horse, Mare, or Gelding, Ridge-line or Goat, be allowed to run, or go at large at any season of the year.

That in the Parishes of Newcastle, and Chatham, no Hog or Swine be allowed to go or run at large in any part of the said Parishes, at any season of the year.

That no Ram be allowed to run or go at large in any part of the County of Northumberland, at any time between the 15th day of August and the 30th day of November.

That no Bull, Ox, Cow, or Neat Cattle, be allowed to run or go at large at any time between the 1st day of November and the first day of May, in that district of Chatham lying between the westerly side of the road leading from Napan, past Saint Andrews church, and the lower line of the Lot on which James Murphy resides, being No. 46.

Ordered that no Sheep, Ram or Lamb be allowed to go at large in that part of the Parish of Chatham, lying between Saint Andrew's Church, and James Murphy's Lower Line, so called, between the first day of November and the first day of May in each year, under the penalty of sixpence for each Sheep, Ram or Lamb so found going at large, contrary to these regulations, to be paid by the owner or owners thereof, before the same shall be released from pound.
