### Northumberland Agricultural Seciety.

At a Meeting of the Board of the Northum

At a Meeting of the Board of the Northum-bertand Agricultural Society, held on Thuras-DAY, the Tith April, 1850, the following Re-gulations and Restrictions, respecting the erec-tion of a Carding, Fulling and Dressing Ma-chine, for which the Society has offered a Trenium of £50, were unanimously adopted: "The object of the Society being to aid in the establishment of useful machinery in a convenient place in the Parish of Chatham or Newcastle for the Carding, Fulling, and Dressing the Wool and Cloth produced and made in the County, they will require parties competing for the Premium to provide suita-ble Buildings, and the medessary Machinery, on the most recent and most approved princi-ples, for Carding, Fulling, and Dressing Wool and Cloth, and on such a socie as will be suit-able for the wants of this County at lesst ; to which the Society is the suitable for the society is the society and the society of the society of the Science is the Scienty at lesst ; to which the wants of this County at least; to which the Society is desirons that Dyeing should be added. The whole establishment to be completed, and in successful and efficient operation, and answering the purposes for which it is required, on or before the first day

of September, 1551. "The competitors for the Premium to send their applications to the Secretary on or be-fore the first day of June next, stating the size and description of the buildings, the different agree to provide and put in operation by the time limited, and the situation where the es-tablishment is intended to be placed. The Board will determine to which of the appli-cants the premium shall be given.
