BRITISH MINISTRY.—There is a report in town, which it is said was put in circulation by two American Gentlemen who came on yesterday from the United States by express, that intelligence was received at New York, by a late arrival from Britain, that the British Ministry had resigned.

YESTERDAY'S MAIL.

We make a few selections by the papers obtained by this mail. We perceive that the Editor of the Fredericton Amaranth, under his editorial head, has copied a portion of Mr Hea's Advertisement from the Gleaner. We presume we shall soon hear of another suit being entered into for Libel.

CANADIAN PARLIAMENT.—On the 24th inst. the Legislative Assembly had under their consideration a set of resolutions proposed Mr Boulton, in detail, a complete scheme of Republican Government. After a debate, the House voted the resolutions to be republican and revolutionary, by 46 to 13.

The number of passengers on board the Griffith when she took fire, was 326. None of the females were saved, except the barber's wife. There were in all about 250 lost, 150 of whom were lying on the beach. The number known to be saved is about 40—*Quebec Gazette.*

Canada and the States.—The Rev. P. Chiquy, the Canadian apostle of temperance, has just completed a tour through the United States. In a letter to a religious order in Canada, he says: I do not exaggerate when I say there are no less than 200,000 Canadians in the United States, and unless efficacious means are taken to stop this frightful emigration, before ten years, two hundred thousand more of our compatriots will have carried to the American Union their arms, their intelligence, and their hearts.—*Montreal Herald.*

On the 12th inst. an Inquisition was held at Maria, in the upper part of this County, by Joseph Meagher, Esq., Senior Officer of Militia; on the body of Ammon Savoy, found drowned. It appeared from the evidence before the Jury that the deceased had left Maria in a flat, for the purpose of going to Dalhousie—the wind blowing hard from the South East drove the frail craft he was in amongst the breakers, when it was immediately upset. The body of the unfortunate man was driven on shore about an hour afterwards. Verdict—Accidental death.—*Gaspé Gazette.*

The New Orleans Picayune of the 14th, says that the Crevasse at Point Coupee is 14 feet deep and six hundred yards wide, sweeping off houses and crops, and ruining plantations. It is still extending, and all attempts to stop it have been abandoned. All Attakapas County stands in great danger of being submerged. If this should occur, hundreds of plantations will be destroyed.

The Doctor of the Viceroy, and Mr Delany, came to Halifax, in the Tender of the Surveying Steamer Columbia. The Viceroy was making a good deal of water. The Columbia was alongside of her rendering assistance. It was expected the Viceroy would be got off.—*Halifax Guardian.*

If properly greased with good, clean, sweet grease or oil, to the satisfaction of the subscriber, it will be Carded for Three Pence per pound.
