chine, for which the Society has offered a Fremum of £50, were unanimously adopted:
"The object of the Society being to aid in the establishment of useful machinery in a convenient place in the Parish of Chatham or Newcastle, for the Carding, Fulling, and Dressing the Wool and Cloth produced and made in the County, they will require parties competing for the Premium to provide suitable Buildings, and the necessary Machinery, that I mus shortly die.
