NEW BRUNSWICK.—We learn that a new and splendid steamer is to run twice a week the ensuing season between Eastport, St. John and Windsor.

The Telegraph again at Fault.—The steamship Niagara, arrived at Halifax early on Thursday morning. The telegraph wires had just strength enough to announce the fact to this City, when they again tumbled down, and refused to convey a single word the whole day.

It is certainly somewhat singular that on the arrival of the steamers with an advance in cotton or any other important article, the line should so suddenly and frequently get out of order.

Terrible Shipwreck.—The ship Agnes, Ahrensfelt, from New York for Bremen, was wrecked on the coast of Texel, on the 19th of December. Twelve of the crew and seven passengers were saved; and the master, nine men and thirty-four passengers drowned.—Saint John New Brunswick, Jan. 26.

UNITED STATES.—The Boston Bee of the 17th instant furnishes the following account of a most distressing accident which had occurred on the Portland and Boston Railroad.

Yesterday afternoon as the two o'clock train of cars from Portland to this city, had passed Kennebunk, one of the wheels on a passenger car broke, letting down the car on one side, and throwing the passengers into confusion worse confounded. The stove in the car was also capsized, and the coals were thrown upon the passengers, burning many of them very severely. The car was set on fire also, and as near as we could learn last evening, about 30 of the passengers were badly, though not supposed to be fatally injured. Several had arms broken.

IMPORTANT FROM HAYTI.—Late accounts from Hayti report a battle between the Haytien and Dominican fleets, near Aux Cayes. The latter had battered inside of the Haytien men-of-war, and the Haytiens escaped by running into shoal water. The Dominican fleet had bombarded and burnt the port of Reviere, reducing it to ashes; and also that of Dame Marie. Several other small ports were also destroyed.

The Emperor had put the monopoly law on seventy additional articles of merchandise, including lumber and other articles of import. Logwood and coffee were scarce. Some of the foreign merchants were about giving up their business, on account of the monopoly law.

RESOLVED, That no Bill of a private nature, or Petition for money or relief, shall be received by the House after the fourteenth day from the opening of the Session, both inclusive; and that the Clerk of this House do, one month previous to the meeting of the Legislature, cause fifty printed copies of this Rule to be sent to each of the Clerks of the Peace in the several Counties for distribution, and cause the same to be inserted in the Royal Gazette, and two Newspapers in such county where Newspapers are published.

WHEREAS the number of applications to this House from School Teachers for Grants of Money have been from year to year increasing; and whereas it is desirable that such information should be furnished as would enable this House to arrive at just and equitable conclusions; therefore

RESOLVED, That this House will in future sustain no applications for allowances to Teachers of Common or Parish Schools, unless it shall be certified by at least two Trustees of Schools for the Parish where such School has been taught, shewing the time actually taught—the Teacher to be licensed—the cause why such Teacher was not certified to the Sessions in the ordinary way—and that such Teacher was not compelled to discontinue his or her School on account of any improper conduct.
