YESTERDAY'S MAIL.

The papers by this mail announce the arrival of the British Steamer Africa at New York, on Wednesday last, in a passage of ten days and seven hours. We copy below a few items of news.

LATER FROM EUROPE.—The Manchester market is in a very unsettled state, and a decline on yarns had been submitted to.

In England much of public attention was engrossed by the Great Fair, which was progressing with all due success. Nothing extraordinary has yet happened to disturb the Show.

On Monday the 5th, the price of admission fell from £1 to 5s. a head. About 6400 persons were admitted at that price, and £1000 sterling were taken at the doors. The demand for season tickets also continued, and the receipts altogether were estimated at £2000 a day.

In the House of Commons, on the 5th inst., Lord John Russell informed the House of the course the Government intended to pursue in consequence of their defeat, by a majority of fourteen, on the motion of Mr Hume against the Renewal of the income tax for three years. His Lordship said the Cabinet were prepared to bow to the decision of the House, and to submit to the appointment of a Select Committee of Enquiry, to consider the details of the obnoxious tax. This impost is therefore doomed to speedy extinction. The reverse of the Ministry on this question was received with universal satisfaction.

In the House of Lords, on the 6th inst., the Duke of Argyll presented nearly 100 petitions, amongst which was one from Glasgow, signed by 56,000 persons against the papal aggressions.

Portugal.—The success of the insurrectionary movement in Portugal would appear to be incomplete. The leader the Duke of Saldanha, has been placed at the head of the Ministry, a station which he held on a former occasion, and then proved faithful to the Queen. It remains to be seen, however, what use he will make of the power which he has attained so suddenly, and probably so unexpectedly to himself.

Italy.—The rumours of a general insurrectionary movement in Italy are repeated, and great agitation is said to have prevailed.

The outbreak was to begin at Genoa. The President of the Council had left Turin for Genoa, in order to calm the Democrats, if possible. Piedmont and England are against the Commercial and political league of the Italian States.

CANADA.—*Toronto, May 20.*—The Parliamentary session was opened to-day; and the Governor, in his speech, stated that the revenue from customs and canals is increasing, and that the change in the Imperial Navigation Laws has increased foreign shipping in the Canadian ports, and that the Emigration Act has been complained of, as being unfavorable to our import trade. The new Postage Law had considerably increased correspondence. The arbitrators appointed to settle the boundary dispute with New Brunswick have reported. A measure will be introduced for reducing the Civil List, and an increase in Parliamentary representation is recommended, and amendments in the School and Municipal Law of Lower Canada.—*Telegraph to Boston papers.*

NEW BRUNSWICK.—We understand that the Hon. Thomas Baillie, the present Surveyor General, has accepted the offer of a retiring allowance of £500 per annum, which was made by the Legislature at its last Session, his resignation on such allowance to take effect on the first day of October next.

The Imperial Government having decided upon paying the salaries of the Governors of these Colonies hereafter, no further question is likely to arise in the Province as to salaries; the progress of events seems to have effectually settled the difficulties heretofore existing.—*St. John New Brunswick.*

THE RAILWAY MEETING AT DALHOUSIE.—The New Brunswick of Saturday has the following candid and sensible remarks on the above meeting:

We are glad to perceive that Restigouche, the northernmost County of New Brunswick, has at length become alive to the importance of Railway proceedings in these Colonies, and has taken a stand upon various points with reference to recent Legislative proceedings, which perhaps it is as well the public should discuss more fully, before expressing a decided opinion. The difference of borrowing money at six per cent, upon debentures which are almost sure at certain periods to be sold at a discount, and which must be paid off in full at the end of thirty years at whatever sacrifice—and drawing the money from the Imperial Treasury, just when required, and with the absolute certainty of its being always had when most wanted, at three and a half per cent, repayable when the condition of the Province may render it convenient, is undoubtedly very great, and worthy of the most careful consideration. The propriety also of granting all the vacant lands within ten miles of the proposed Railway, to private companies, for their own advantage, may well be doubted.

The resolutions passed at Dalhousie, backed as they are by the names of the most in-

telligent and influential persons in that part of the Province, as movers and seconders, are well worthy of attention, and will no doubt have their influence in checking precipitate proceedings in matters which should be well and deeply weighed before arriving at the final determination.

From the Sandwich Islands the papers are to the 14th of March. The French it is said, threaten a blockade of the ports, which, it is added, would be the signal for running up the United States flag with the Hawaiian.

Important from Cuba.—A letter from Port Principe, dated May 11, to a respectable gentleman in New York, says—"The signal for our rising has been given. Yesterday afternoon a great outrage was perpetrated by Spanish despotism in this city. Nine of our most eminent and wealthy citizens were simultaneously arrested and taken to prison, and this morning, long before day, closely guarded, they were sent off to Havana and the dungeons of the Moro. These arrests were made by order of the Captain General to our Governor. The next steamer will bring you stirring news."

The schr Perseverance cleared at Halifax for this Port on Saturday week.

DEATH.

This morning, at 8 o'clock, after a painful and protracted illness, which he bore with Christian submission, Doctor ALEXANDER KEY, in the 57th year of his age.

Dr. Key has long been distinguished in this Province, for his skill and ability as a Physician: as the ever ready friend of the needy and afflicted, and for his unflinching integrity of purpose. He has resided in this place for thirty five years, and during this long period has enjoyed an extensive practice.—His loss will be severely felt and his death deeply lamented.

The funeral will take place on Thursday afternoon, at 3 o'clock.—Friends and acquaintances are respectfully invited to attend.
