Cloth to be Milled and Dressed should not be less than a yard in width, and well wove besides, and the Wool for the above mentioned Cloth should be very particularly sorted out so as to have it all of the one kind, and in no case sheared and pulled wool to be put in the same cloth, if intended for the Fulling Mill. If Cotton and Wool, it should be wove Mole-skin Twill, as it is much the best way to be done.

OF THE NORTHUMBERLAND AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY, For 1851.

PLOUGHING MATCH.

The Ploughing Match of the Northumberland Agricultural Society, for the current year, will take place at Chatham, on THURSDAY, the 2d of October next. The undermentioned Prizes are offered by the Society to competition, by its members, on that day, subject to the following Rules and Regulations:

RULES AND REGULATIONS OF PLOUGHING MATCH.

- 1. Teams must be on the ground by Nine, and be ready to commence work by Ten o'clock. 2. All persons who may have won the First Prize for two years shall not be eligible to compete this year. 3. Three Judges shall be appointed by the Board of Directors, and their names shall be announced by the secretary on the morning of competition. 4. The Society will provide for the expense of ferrying all horses that have actually been engaged in the competition of the day.

5. The prescribed size of the Furrow shall be 8 by 4 1/2 inches, or as near thereto as may be.—The size of the Furrow shall be a consideration of merit with the Judges.

CATTLE SHOW.

The Cattle Show will take place on the same day, and near the same place as the Ploughing Match.

The undermentioned Premiums will be competed for, by members of the Society, under the following

RULES AND REGULATIONS:

- 1. All Cattle and Horses must be on the ground, and ready to be entered for competition, by 11 o'clock, A. M.; and none will be admitted after 12 o'clock, noon. 2. To render any animal admissible for competition, by a member of the Society, the only condition will be that he will be prepared to prove by certificate, the breed and age of his animal. 3. Three Judges will be appointed on the morning of the show, and their names will be announced by the Secretary. 4. The decision of any two of the Judges shall be final; but, except in the case of Entire Horses and Bulls, the Judges shall not withhold any premium, on the ground that the animal or animals exhibited are not worthy of it. 5. The Ferrriage of all Cattle entered for Exhibition, having to cross the River, will be provided for by the Society.
