THIS DAY'S MAIL

We observe by a Telegraph communication received in town from New York that a Resolution passed the Canadian Parliament on Thursday last, appropriating sixteen millions of dollars to the line of Railway to be extended from Halifax. SECOND EDITION.

TUESDAY MORNING, AUGUST 12.

The Steamer Rose from Charlottetown, arrived here this morning at 7 o'clock, and leaves again at 1 P. M. She brought a number of passengers.

HALIFAX.—At a meeting of the Liberal party held on the Parade on the 7th instant, the following gentlemen were nominated as Candidates to represent the City and County in General Assembly: Messrs. W. Annand, John Esson, L. O'C. Doyle, and Benjamin Wier. The Conservative party have called a meeting, which is to be held at the Masonic Room, in the Exchange, to nominate two candidates for the Town and County. It is said that Messrs. T. M. Grassie, and David Allison are the parties to be proposed.  
 The inhabitants of this city have decided on having a Regatta. It is to come off on the 10th of September.

SIR JOHN FRANKLIN.—Our British papers contain an article copied from the Dundee Warder, which gives an account of the discovery, a short distance inland from Lancaster sound, of the dead bodies of four seamen, supposed to have belonged to Sir John Franklin's expedition. We shall publish the particulars as they appear, next week.

NEW BRUNSWICK.—On Wednesday evening last, about 7 o'clock, Andrew Weldon, aged 19, and John Fillamore, about 22, were unfortunately drowned while bathing in the Dorchester river. It appears that neither of them could swim, nor could any of the party by whom they were accompanied. Fillamore being the first to enter the water, took the precaution to wade out as far as he thought prudent, and set up a stake in the mud, supposing there could be no danger within its limit; but unfortunately the bank was very steep, and he consequently slipped and disappeared. His heroic but ill-fated companion seeing this, had the temerity to plunge in to the rescue, and he also immediately disappeared. Their companions, among whom were two brothers of the victims, immediately rendered what assistance was in their power, and one of the brothers succeeded in grasping the hand of one of the sufferers, but, in self-preservation, was compelled to relinquish it. The bodies were found about three hours afterwards, side by side.

Steamer Gipsy.—The steamer Gipsy, from the Bend of Petitcodiac, in entering this harbor on Wednesday morning, during a thick fog, struck on Mispick Point, and soon after sunk. The passengers and crew all got safely on shore. Efforts are being made to raise the vessel, which we hope will prove successful, as the loss of this fine little steamer would be a serious drawback to her enterprising owner, James Whitney, Esq.

We insert to-day an address from four of the six Representatives from this City and County relative to the recent Executive appointments. We understand that active exertions are in progress for calling the proposed meeting of the Electors, which it is expected will be numerously attended from all parts of the County.—St. John Courier.

We learn from a Boston paper, that 120 vessels manned by 1200 men, are now absent from the port of Gloucester, in Massachusetts, on fishing voyages to the Bay of Chaleur, on which fishery the town of Gloucester mainly depends for its prosperity! The fisheries on the American coast have greatly failed this season, the fishermen having done nothing as yet.

The Gloucester vessels are chiefly engaged in the mackerel fishery at Bay Chaleur, on which there is no bounty in the United States—the bounty is confined to the deep sea fishery for Cod, which must be dry-cured of the first quality. If the people of Gloucester can make two voyages to the Bay of Chaleur for mackerel, each season, and prosper by it, surely our own people living on those shores, and conducting the fishery at less expense, ought to find it profitable. We fear there is a want of industry and energy among the resident fishermen.—St. John New Brunswicker.

WEST INDIES.—Tobago.—From Tobago we are informed of the sudden death of Mr Ross, the newly-arrived Lieutenant Governor. His Excellency, had attended an entertainment on the occasion of the anniversary of Her Majesty's Coronation, (the 28th June,) and was returning home, when he was thrown from his gig and killed on the spot. The servant and horse escaped without injury. Tobago has been singularly unfortunate with her Governors. Death removes them, as

they succeed each other, with an unsparring hand.

We have Kingston dates of the 26th. The cholera still prevails throughout the Island, especially at Hanover, Lucia, Elgintown, and Savanna la Mar. At the latter place there have been 269 deaths in the last few weeks. The epidemic is raging fearfully throughout the agricultural districts.

The present crop of sugar is not over 7000 hhds., about half what it formerly was in the most unremunerating years of slavery. Every article of trade has advanced in Kingston since last advices.—New York, Aug. 6.

FROM CALIFORNIA.—Great Fire at San Francisco.—The steamer Empire City arrived at New York on Wednesday, with dates from San Francisco to the 1st of July. The principal item of news is the particulars of another extensive conflagration in San Francisco, which took place on the 22d of June, destroying 600 houses. Loss of property, about \$3,000,000.

The Empire City brought 380 passengers, and \$1,000,000 in gold.

A great deal of lumber has been burnt up, and it will be a long time, we fear, ere our district is built over again. There was evidently an arranged plan to set fire to and consume the city.

The Francisco Market report of 1st July, states the business of the place to have been again much deranged by the late disastrous fire—Lumber and Bricks to be firmer—Provisions generally, without improvement or demand.

Mining Prospects.—All accounts from the Mines concur in representing the yield this year as greater perhaps than ever before.

NOVA SCOTIA.—Halifax.—The New Barracks to be erected at Fort Needham will occupy a square area of about eleven acres; the whole to be enclosed by an iron-stone wall, on which at intervals several towers are to be built; indeed those conversant with the excellent plans furnished by the Engineer Department in this Garrison, assert that the establishment will be equivalent to a strong fortification. The lower stories of the building are to be constructed of granite; the upper of freestone or brick; in short it will be the greatest public improvement of the kind ever yet undertaken in the Colonies.—Chronicle.
