Mr Ritchie replied that he had not attacked the contraction of Mr Ritchie replied that he had not attacked the government to which Mr Street belonged, and should not wait for his return. He had attacked the government of the last two or three years. He had no chiection to postthree years. He had no objection to post-hone the debate until to morrow, when the government he had arraigned must be prepa-red to defend themselves. The debate was then adjourned.—St. John New Brunswicker.
