the Governor General on the occasion, from which we copy the following extracts:—

"The satisfactory condition of the provincial revenue and credit, the progress of public improvement, the creditable appearance of Canadian industry at the Exhibition of Industry of all nations, and in harmony with which the three branches of the Legislature co-operate for the public good have attracted much attention to the province and removed some prejudices and misgivings engendered by years of disquiet.

"At the close of Parliament I feel that I am entitled to congratulate you on the share which you have had in the bringing about these gratifying results. It is my firm resolution to continue to administer the government in conformity to the wishes of the people of the province as expressed through the local government, believing that this course of proceeding on my part is best calculated to secure contentment and peace, which are the foundations of national prosperity, and trusting that the religious principles and good sense of the people of the province will induce them to eschew violent and extreme courses to cultivate habitual respect for the law and rights of property, and to cherish towards each other feelings of mutual kindness and good will.

"The measures which you have matured with much care and deliberation for the encouragement of railway enterprise will, I trust, be productive of very beneficial results to the province at large by attracting trade, enhancing the value of property, promoting the settlement of the country, and leading to increased intercourse between the sister colonies."

The Editor of this paper thus notices the result of the labors of the session:

"After a Session of nearly four months duration, Parliament has been prorogued. All the measures of General interest that have been carried are mentioned in His Excellency's speech, while those which have not been so happily disposed of are hardly, if at all, alluded to. It was scarcely to have been expected indeed that any allusion would be made to the awkward position of the ministry, to Tiffau combinations, or to the reform union in Canada West. The quiet expression of a hope that the good sense of the people of the Province will induce them to eschew violent course may, however, be aimed at the united (1) reformers of the western section of this contented and happy province. If the measures which have been carried are not many, they are not unimportant. These for the construction of a line of Railway through British territory to Halifax, for the improvement of the navigation of the River St. Lawrence and for the remission of light dues will tend to free the Parliament from a charge of having legislated to no purpose. To ministers and to reformers the session has been a mortifying one—to the former in one sense of the word, to the latter in another. The elections will speedily be upon us now; but how the British party will act under such trying circumstances it is impossible to say—whether in the usual lie down and be-kicked spirit, or with unwonted energy—a short time will tell."

FREDERICTON.—The Head Quarters of Wednesday gives a long and very interesting account of the Bazaar, which was held on the grounds of Judge Wilnot, for the purpose of raising funds for rebuilding the Wesleyan Chapel, in Fredericton, recently destroyed by fire. It was a grand affair, and we are happy to learn, that the large sum of £600 was realized.

ENGLISH NEWS.—By the Steamer America at New York.—On the 20th of August, one of the most destructive fires, as regards loss of valuable property, that has occurred in Glasgow for some time, broke out in the extensive stores of Messrs. C. Tennent & Co., which destroyed a large amount of valuable goods, consisting of oil, shumac, madders, sago, turpentine and sulphur. The sum of £47,000 was insured upon the goods destroyed, and £6000 on the building.

Dreadful Colliery Explosion.—Thirty to Forty Lives Lost.—On Monday night, one of those disastrous and fatal events which are so frequent in the mining districts, took place at Washington colliery, which is about two miles from the Washington station of the York, Newcastle, and Berwick Railway, and, we regret to say, that the explosion has resulted in the death of from thirty to forty persons, most of whom were in the health and vigour of youth.

No language can describe the intense grief and horror of those who, on the first report being given, rushed to the spot, and remained to witness the blackened and disfigured corpses of their husbands, children, and fathers, who only a few hours before left them in their usual health.

LATER FROM CUBA.—A despatch from Charleston, dated the 2nd Sept., asserts that letters received in that city from some of the principal mercantile houses in Havana contradicted entirely the reported success of Lopez, as stated in the verbal accounts published.

These letters, (says the despatch,) several of which we have been permitted to peruse, bear date, August 23d, and state that Lopez had but 150 men left, and it was the belief of the writers that they would soon be captured or destroyed.

The remainder of his expedition, some 200, had been shot. No mention is made in any of these letters of the Creoles joining Lopez's standard.

A despatch from Washington further states that Government has received despatches from New Orleans dated the 2d, P. M., which state that up to the 25th, Lopez had been scarcely able to maintain himself, not a single Creole had joined him, and his prospects were most desperate. What fighting he had, had been in his own defence and in the defence of his followers, not for the Cubans nor for a Cuban revolution. No reinforcements have gone from New Orleans, nor will any go, if there is any virtue in the army and navy of the United States.

NEW BRUNSWICK.—The Rowing Match between the four-oared race gigs Xyphias and Experiment, for £200 a side, was finally run on Thursday afternoon. The day was favorable for the race, and all points of the city from which a good view of it could be obtained, were crowded with spectators, to witness a trial of skill and strength, which has excited a good deal of interest for some time past. The distance, about six miles, was accomplished by the Carleton boat in 32½ minutes—said to be the shortest time it has ever been pulled in a four oared boat—beating her competitor from Indian Town about one minute. The Carleton oarsmen have therefore again succeeded in obtaining the belt which they had previously worn for a long time, but which was latterly the property of the able oarsmen of Indian Town.

On Thursday evening the victory was celebrated in Carleton by a Ball and a Supper at the Town Hall, on which occasion the successful oarsmen were presented with a purse of £25 each.

The Steamer Herald, on her way down from the Bend of Petitcodiac, on Tuesday morning, got ashore on Quaco ledges, but floated off again next day, and was brought into this harbor on Wednesday night, having sustained but very little damage.—St. John Courier.

Protection of the Fisheries.—We learn from Canada, that the Legislature of that Province has voted £1000 to be expended in the employment of an armed Steamer for the protection of the Fisheries in the Gulf of Saint Lawrence and Bay of Chaleur, which are now greatly trespassed upon by the fishing vessels of France and the United States.—St. John New Brunswick.

WEST INDIES.—By the British mail steamer Merlin at New York, we have St. Thomas dates of the 21st, Bermuda to the 27th, Demerara to the 29th, and Surinam to the 7th August. On the 18th, St. Thomas and vicinity was visited with a frightful hurricane, which lasted fifteen hours, causing the destruction of a large amount of property. All the small craft in the harbor were driven ashore, and many larger vessels were severely injured.

The gale was also severely felt at St. Croix. At Bassin, the vessels in port got foul of each other, and did considerable damage.

Demerara papers contain advices from Surinam to the 7th August, from which we learn that there had been no abatement of the yellow fever since the previous accounts. According to government returns over 100 persons died of the fever in the small town of Paramaribo during the month of July.

Accounts from the West Indies have been received to the 26th ult.

The St. Lucia Palladium has an account of an eruption of the long dormant volcano on Mount Pelee, which took place on the night of the 5th of August. The whole town in

the immediate vicinity of the mountain, was covered with ashes. The inhabitants were obliged to fly from their houses, and seek refuge in a neighboring village.
