Dreadful Riot.—Philadelphia, Sept. 2-A fearful fugitive slave riot occurred at Chris-tiana. Lancaster County, yesterday morning. Mr. Gorsuch, the owner of the slave was kil-led, and his son mortally wounded Several other. other persons were injured. The officers were driven from the ground by eighty armed

were driven from the ground by eighty armed acgroes. The conductor of the Pennsylvania Rail-road has furnished the Philadelphia Enquirer 1 this morning with the following addition-al particulars : It appears that Mr Gorsuch, the owner of two fugitives from Paltimore ceanty, accompanied by his two sons, the de-puty U. S. Marshal from Baltimore, two U. S. officers from this city, and several police-men, also from this city, proceeded on Wed-nesday evening to Christiana, about 21 miles this side of Laucaster for the purpose of ar-resting the fugitives. After a consultation between the officers, it was deemed inexpe-dient to make the arrest until yesterday morn-ing. From the best reports we learn that the ing. From the best reports we learn that the colored population in the vicinity being in-formed of the nature of the visit of these offi-cers to Christiana, held a meeting and asked the opinion of several leading abolitionists as to what several leading habilitionists as to what course they should pursue. The an-swer was, as one of the most current reports

swer was, as one of the most current reports states, that they should stand their ground. Accordingly about 80 negroes assembled with guns, &c., and secreted themselves in the neighboring woods and corn-fields; the signal attack on the officers was the blowing of a horn. When the officers came upon the party they were surrounded on all sides and a deally fire poured upon them by the ne-groes. groes

At the first fire Mr Gorsuch, an elderly gentleman, and the owner of the fugitive, was instantly killed, and one of his sons mortally wounded ; another of the party, said to be a U. S. Deputy officer from Baltimore, was also much hurt; a Philadelphia officer was fired at five times and missed.




