YESTERDAY'S MAIL.

The papers by this mail put us in possession of some important news. We give below such extracts as our limited space will allow.

NOVA SCOTIA.—Mr G. R. Young has signified his intention to the people of Pictou not to offer again for that County.

The Villager, Watt, cleared at Halifax, for Miramichi on Tuesday last.

NEW BRUNSWICK.—*Public Meeting.*—A Requisition having been on Wednesday presented to the High Sheriff of this City and County, signed by a number of Magistrates and other gentlemen, requesting him to call a public meeting of the inhabitants of this city at the Mechanics' Institute, at three o'clock, for the purpose of hearing the Hon. Mr Howe from Nova Scotia.

On motion of the Hon. John Robertson, the High Sheriff, Charles Johnston, Esq., was unanimously called to the Chair; and G. Blatch, Esq., was requested to act as Secretary.

The Chairman having introduced the Hon. Mr Howe to the meeting, the Hon. Gentleman immediately addressed the audience in a long and highly interesting speech; and was followed by the Hon. John Robertson, R. Payne, J. H. Gray, and W. J. Ritchie, Esqrs. On motion of the Hon. John Robertson, seconded by the Hon. J. R. Partelow, it was

Resolved, unanimously, That whatever difference of opinion may exist, as respects the proposals which the Hon. Mr Howe has so ably advocated, the thanks of this meeting are due and are hereby tendered to him, for the clear manner in which he has explained his views, and more particularly for the able manner in which he has advocated the claims of the North American Colonies before Her Majesty's Government.

Railway Meeting.—In our first page will be found a notice of a meeting held at Dorchester, connected with the projected Railway; a similar meeting also took place at the Bend on Monday last. The meeting was addressed by the Honorable Mr Howe, and the following Resolutions passed:

Resolved, That this meeting hail with pleasure the passage through this Province of the Hon. Joseph Howe, Provincial Secretary of Nova Scotia, on a mission through New Brunswick to Canada, in company with the hon. E. B. Chandler, to concoct plans for the construction of Railways throughout British North America—and take this opportunity of expressing their feelings of gratitude to him for the very able manner in which he advocated, while in England, the interests of these Provinces generally, and obtained such liberal offers of assistance from the Mother Country.

Resolved, That from the known ability of the Hon. Mr Howe, delegate from Nova Scotia, and the hon. Mr Chandler, from this Province, this meeting entertains the confident hope that such measures may be adopted by the convention in Canada as will lead to an early commencement of both the Halifax and Quebec and the European and North American Railways.

On Monday night the Pail Factory recently erected by Mr Thos. Miller, near the Falls, was burned down, with its contents, causing a serious loss to the enterprising proprietor.

On Wednesday night a large building at the Straight Shore, in the Parish of Portland, occupied by several families, caught fire, and burnt so rapidly that the inmates had much difficulty in making their escape—a girl, 8 or 10 years old, is stated to have lost her life in the flames.

A valuable Grist Mill, Saw Mill, and barn, belonging to Mr Wm. Redstone, of Jerusalem, Queen's County, with their contents, including 400 bushels of grain, and a horse and cow, valued in all at £500, were destroyed by fire on the night of the 19th. No cause can be assigned for the fire.

The dwelling house of Mr James Davison, of St. George, was consumed on Saturday last, with a great part of its contents.—*St. John Courier.*

FROM EUROPE.—The Collins steamer Pacific arrived at Liverpool on the 20th May, in 9 days 19 hours, which is the quickest passage ever made. The London Times states that the Pacific beat the best time of any Cunard steamer at Holyhead, by six hours.

The receipts of the great exhibition averages £300 per day. The scheme for turning the exhibition to educational purposes progresses favorably.

Letters from Constantinople announce the conclusion of the amnesty question. Kossuth and five others were to be excluded from its operation.

A building in London, on Grace Church street, fell, killing and wounding several persons. The same day a calamitous fire took place near Lower Thames street, at which several persons were killed.

Accounts from Manila state that on the 29th January last, an attack had been made by the Governor General on the forts at Sooboo, which resulted in their capture, together with 140 pieces of artillery and other munitions of war.

The insurrectionary movements still continued in the Chinese empire.

The Cunard steamship Asia arrived at New York on Wednesday morning at 8 o'clock, having sailed from Liverpool on the 4th ult., at half-past 3 o'clock, P.M., thus making the passage in 10 days, 16 hours and 9 minutes.

Government had determined to give ample aid to the Halifax and Quebec railway.

The Ministry had been fully sustained on the Papal Aggression Bill.

Kossuth and his fellow prisoners had been set at liberty.

The President of the French Republic attended a review on the 22d ult., in the Champ de Mars. Everything passed off quietly. The President, who was accompanied by General Narvaez, was received with shouts of *Vive Napoleon!*

Accounts have been received from Lisbon to the 12th. Saldanha had chartered two steamers to convey him and his troops to Lisbon. The Queen is said to be disposed to meet Saldanha's views with respect to the formation of a ministry.

There has been a most dangerous flood at Vienna. With one exception all the bridges have been carried.

MELANCHOLY ACCIDENT.—Last evening Daniel Murray, a man employed in driving timber on the river, fell from a log near Sugar Island, and was drowned. He was a native of Restigouche, and a steady, active young man, aged about 19 years. His body was recovered in about half an hour, and brought to this city. An inquest was held before Henry Fisher, Esq., and a verdict of accidental death by drowning was returned.—*Fredericton Reporter.*
