

THIS DAY'S MAIL.

BRITISH NEWS.—The Cunard Steamer Asia, with three days later intelligence, arrived at New York on Wednesday morning, a little less than eleven days from Liverpool. The New York Tribune has advices of the passage of the Ecclesiastical Titles Bill by the House of Commons by a large majority. The Jewish Emancipation bill was passed in the House of Commons without a division. It is thought it will be defeated in the other house.

By the death of the Earl of Derby, Lord Stanley, the well known Tory leader in Parliament, becomes the fourteenth Earl of Derby.

Dr. Philpotts Synod at Exeter has closed its sittings after adopting the declaration of baptismal regeneration: Dr. Philpotts solemnly exclaiming, at the termination, "God be praised!"

Riot at Liverpool.—A terrific military riot broke out in Liverpool on the 1st inst., the 91st Regiment having attacked the police. The riot was suppressed after a time by the energy of the authorities; but not before several men had been killed and many dangerously wounded.

NEW BRUNSWICK.—The Hon. Mr Howe arrived in town last evening in the steamer Creole, on his return to Nova Scotia from Canada. The hon. gentleman proceeded last night to Dorchester in the steamer Gipse, and would spend a day or two with the Hon. E. B. Chandler, the delegate to Canada from this Province.

The Hon. J. W. Weldon, of Richibucto, was also a passenger in the Gipse.

The Quebec Times states that in Mr Howe's speech at Quebec "he touched lightly on the difficulties which were likely to arise from the unwillingness of New Brunswick to bear her share of the cost, and stated it on his conviction that Canada and Nova Scotia should make up the deficiency, and each contribute their share towards that portion of the road which crosses New Brunswick."

In his speech at Montreal Mr Howe stated that there were some difficulties in New Brunswick, but Mr Chandler had gone back to that Province, and he thought that in the course of a short time they would be overcome. * * * There may be a risk, perhaps, he added, in one part of the line, but it would be lessened by the increase of population, and the numbers that would be thrown into New Brunswick.—*St. John Courier.*

The St. John New Brunswicker concludes an article on the subject of the Portland Railway as follows:—

"It is quite evident now, and seems clearly admitted on all hands, that no further steps will be taken at this time to form a Railway Company; the attempt has failed, and the thing itself is dead! The Freeman chants its death song, and the Morning News howls its requiem. The Coroner's Inquest, viewing the departed, may safely return this verdict—Died of strangulation in its birth! Thus ends the second and last chapter of the Railway Company."

STEAMER ROSE.—We perceive by the Charlottetown papers, that this steamer will leave that place for Miramichi, at 2 o'clock on the morning of Monday next—and leave here on Tuesday afternoon.

P. E. ISLAND.—James D. Hazard, Esq., who has held the office of Queen's Printer, of this Island, for nearly twenty-five years, has been ousted to make room for the Honorable Edward Whelan.

NEW BRUNSWICK.—The Railway Meeting of Monday.—At the Meeting of Monday there was much to dishearten and disappoint; to weaken the necessary reliance on the energy, self-reliance, and unanimity of our own people, and to render the hopes heretofore entertained, of an early commencement of the great work tainter, and less vivid.—*St. John Freeman.*

CANADA.—The Resolutions to be proposed in the Canadian Legislature, by the Hon. Mr Hincks, on the subject of the construction of a Trunk Line of Railway through the Provinces, &c., are on the whole satisfactory. All that relates to the Halifax and Quebec undertaking is so in the highest degree.—*Quebec Chronicle.*

CAMP OF GOOD HOPE.—The intelligence from this quarter is to the effect that the Kaffir war still continues.

At Tamboukies, Captain Tylden had a battle with the rebels, in which two hundred and sixteen of them were killed. The Dutch frontier Boers behaved with great bravery.

A rebel chief named Masosi had been attacked by Major Donovan, and defeated. The Kaffirs lost three hundred, 64 of which were drowned in attempt to cross the river.

France.—The President after quitting Poitiers and arriving at Chateaurant July 2nd, was received by the National Guard, who instantly shouted, "Viva la Republique," in which the inhabitants joined. The cry continued until the President had reached the Hotel de Ville, where it assumed the character of serious hostility, and became "down with Napoleon." The disturbance was quelled by the police.

Portugal.—There was some insubordination in the army.

There are still rumours of increasing difficulties between the Porte and the Pacha of Egypt.

The Russians have again been worsted by their implacable enemies the Caucasians.

The proceedings respecting the fate of Kossuth are all concealed in the strictest diplomatic obscurity.

A series of hurricanes has swept Ceylon and the eastern coast of India, occasioning as far as yet known the loss of sixteen vessels. Serious apprehensions were entertained for the safety of the steamer Bombay. The storm did not reach Bombay or the western but a hurricane, probably one of the same series, dismasted several ships at the Mauritius.

A fearful devastation of property has been occasioned by a storm at Charkhoff in Russia. Several persons were killed. The hurricane lasted two hours and a half.

If Cotton and Wool, it should be woven Moleskin Twill, as it is much the best way to be done.
