

ITALY.—Another band of brigands had been captured in the northern provinces. Great sensation prevailed at Fabriano on account of the beheading (considered unjust) of three young men of that city.

AUSTRIA.—The Austrian papers state that the military Governor of Vienna has addressed a circular to all the newspaper editors of the capital, informing them that, for the future, they will not be allowed to mention any arrests which take place, or to publish the names of the persons so arrested, because it has been proved that such publication interferes with the judicial proceedings. A similar circular has been addressed to the provincial newspapers.

The London Daily News says, "The news from the Cape of Good Hope is encouraging. Gen. Somerset had inflicted a succession of severe defeats on the Caffres in Water Kloof. The weapons of the 60th rifles told with great effect. It was supposed that Macome would not be able to hold out much longer. The Caffres were still in great force in Fish River Bush and Amatolee. It is feared, however, that any opening prospect of success would lead to a wider extension of the war, which may, before long, spread eastward beyond Kee, and northward beyond Orange River."

Much satisfaction was felt at the arrival of the promised ordinance, comprising the frame of a sufficiently liberal form of government.

The Cape Town Mail of the 4th December says, "The enemy in Fish River Bush district had been repulsed in several skirmishes, but with no important results, except in one instance, where several thousand sheep and cattle were captured. In the Water Kloof, Major Somerset, with 3000 men, had driven the Caffres away after several hours' hard fighting on different days. The whole camp of the latter was destroyed, and their loss severe. The riflemen and artillery did great service. The British loss on the 14th and 16th November is 6 killed and 26 wounded, including the following:—Lieut. Norris, died of wounds; Captain Addison, severely wounded; Ensign Ricketts, dangerously wounded. On 23rd, 3 killed and 60th rifles; 74th Highlanders, 5 wounded. The number of Caffres killed is reported at from 400 to 500. Another movement was contemplated. In other districts no improvement is reported."

COMMERCIAL.

The excitement and uncertainty induced by the events in France, which last week invaded all branches of commerce, and materially interfered with business, has been greatly abated. Business has consequently become more steady and assumed a better tone. The money market has continued to advance for the last few days, the fluctuations which characterised its operations during the last and beginning of the present week has subsided. From ninety six and a half, the point to which Consols fell on the first news of the Revolution in France becoming known in this country, they have risen to ninety eight and one eighth. The news from the Cape extends sixteen days later than the previous intelligence, and is regarded as less unfavorable. The advices from the continental exchanges are of a varied character as regards the effects produced by the French Revolution. At Frankfort there was a strong opinion that Louis Napoleon would maintain his power, and that there would be a great rise in stocks, particularly in Austrian. On the other hand in the Dutch markets there was a decided want of confidence, and orders for the sale of the French Rentes was general.

The present complete success of Louis Napoleon is telling favorably in our manufacturing districts. The consumption of Metal still continues good, but the trade is inactive; prices, however, are not depressed. In Colonial Produce previous rates are sustained for nearly all articles, but home dealers have operated with reluctance.

LATEST NEWS.

FRANCE.—Four more departments are declared in a state of siege, and the Minister of War has sent a circular to the generals throughout France to cause the immediate execution of all persons taken for the commission of acts of murder and pillage.

Several distinguished Orleanists have sent in their adhesion to the Government. On the statement of a London journal, that the Prince de Joinville and the Duke d'Aumale intended to place themselves at the head of a movement in France, there has been a meeting of some of the chiefs of the Orleanist party, at which it was unanimously resolved to write to the Prince and declare that they could not support any attempt on his part to keep up a civil war.

Most of the leading members of the Mountain against whom warrants are out, have avoided arrest, but it is supposed that most of them are still in Paris. Victor Hugo was safe up to yesterday.

It appears to be true that M. Thiers has left Paris. It is said that he was obliged to go sooner than he intended, as he had been imprudent enough, immediately after his release to declare against the Government. The Council of Louis Napoleon had a sitting today, but nothing has transpired respecting the proceedings.

I am assured that the President of the Republic has received several letters warning him to be on his guard against assassins, but he pays little, if any, attention to them. He goes out, it is true, with guards, but in an open carriage; and it is the opinion of many of his friends that he exposes himself too much at this moment.

New Brunswick.

House of Assembly.

The following were adopted as Standing Rules in the Session of 1851:

37th. That no Bill of a private nature, or Petition for money or relief, shall be received by the House after the fourteenth day from the opening of the Session, both inclusive; and that the Clerk of this House do, one month previous to the opening of the Legislature, cause fifty printed copies of this Rule to be sent to each of the Clerks of the Peace in the several Counties for distribution, and cause the same to be inserted in the Royal Gazette, and two Newspapers in such County where Newspapers are published.

38th. That this House will sustain no application for allowance to Teachers of Common or Parish Schools, unless it shall be certified by at least two Trustees of Schools for the Parish where such School has been taught, shewing the time actually taught—the Teacher to be licenced—the cause why such Teacher was not certified to the Sessions in the ordinary way—and that such Teacher was not compelled to discontinue his or her School on account of any improper conduct.
