

until she was obliged to drop it from sheer exhaustion. The children were nearly frozen. They are well worthy of the benevolence of our citizens.—*Milwaukee Wisconsin, November 22.*

The Panama Route.—A letter states that it is generally understood that the United States Government has entered into a new contract with New Grenada, by which the latter yields its original contract for the transportation of the United States Mails across the Isthmus, and that a contract has been made for that purpose between the United States and the Panama Rail Road Company. By this arrangement it is expected the mails will be carried through from San Francisco to New York in twenty four days. The rainy season was nearly over. The Railroad has been completed from Navy Bay to three miles this side of Gatune, and the cars are running daily. An extensive hotel is about to be opened at Panama to be called the Aspinwall House.

Washington, Dec. 3.—The Russian and Spanish Ministers and other members of the Foreign delegation were present at the discussion in the Senate to-day of Foote's Kossuth resolution. They took a deep interest in the affair, and when Cass arose to speak, Bodisco and Calderon left their seats and placed themselves in the most favorable position for catching every word, and manifested considerable emotion at his denunciation of despotism.

The complicated and unsettled relation of affairs between Great Britain and the United States, touching the Musquito kingdom and some of the Central American Governments, has received a very awkward illustration, from the circumstance of the British man of war brig Express, firing at and bringing the American steamer Prometheus to anchor at San Juan, until anchorage and port dues, demanded by the authorities of Greytown, constituted by the authority of the king of Musquito, should be paid. The amount demanded, \$123, was paid by Captain Churchill, of the Prometheus, under protest, and the steamer was allowed to depart.

The affair has caused a good deal of excitement in the United States, and it is stated that the President has ordered a competent naval force to be despatched to San Juan, for the protection of American vessels, and at the same time directed that communications should be addressed to the British Government on the subject.

Destructive Conflagration.—A fire broke out between four and five o'clock on Sunday morning last, in the store of Messrs. Lariabee and Jordan, Commercial Wharf, Portland, Maine, which destroyed 27 stores, with valuable stocks of flour, provisions and heavy groceries, and burnt or damaged nine vessels before the progress of the flames was arrested. The total amount of the losses is variously estimated at from \$100,000 to \$150,000.

The Northumberland Agricultural Society's GENERAL EXHIBITION will take place in Chatham, on WEDNESDAY, the 21st day of January next.

The undermentioned Premiums are offered to Competition by the Society, for Articles, the "Produce of the Dairy, and Domestic Manufactures;" and the undermentioned Prizes and Prizes, (both inclusive) for Grains, Garden Seeds, &c.

RULES AND REGULATIONS.

1. No premium shall be awarded for any article of Domestic Manufacture, or Produce of the Dairy, which has not been wholly manufactured and prepared for Exhibition within this County.
 2. That all articles brought for Exhibition, must have been manufactured, raised or produced, within one year from the date of competition, (Cheese excepted.)
 3. That the prizes for Domestic Manufactures shall be open to general competition; but persons who have won prizes of Ten Shillings and upwards for such manufactures shall pay the annual Subscription of Five Shillings before receiving the said prizes.
 4. That no price or prize be awarded for Grains, Garden Seeds, &c., nor any premium for Dairy Produce, except to Members of the Society, who have paid their annual subscription.
 5. That all persons bringing for Exhibition, any article of Domestic Manufacture, Grain, or Dairy Produce, shall accompany the same with a statement setting forth that the Exhibitor is the owner of the article in question. If Domestic Manufactures—that the materials were produced, and the articles manufactured, prepared within the County during the preceding year! If Grain and Seeds—that the articles were raised by the Exhibitor on the premises occupied by him, during the past year, and were not Exhibited for a premium on any former occasion: And if Dairy Produce, a similar statement subscribed, by the owner. These certificates to be handed to the Committee when the articles are being entered for Competition.
 6. That no Individual who is awarded the first prize on any article, shall be entitled to a second prize on the same description of article.
 7. The Judges shall not withhold any premium on the ground, merely that the article is unworthy of a prize.
 8. All articles to be exhibited by persons belonging to the Parish Chatham, Napan, and the neighboring Back Settlements; and all articles to be exhibited by persons belonging to the Parish of Newcastle, must be deposited in the hands of the Receiving Committee, Messrs. J. M. Johnson, William J. Fraser, and Henry Wyse, on the day preceding the Exhibition, and no article will be received by the Committee from persons residing at greater distances, after ten o'clock, on the morning of the 21st.
 9. Instead of offering Premiums for the best samples of Clover and Timothy Seeds, and of Grain and Garden Seeds, &c., the Society now offers PRIZES for those articles, which prices include the premiums also.
 10. No article of Grain or Seeds of any kind, which has undergone any chemical, or fire-drying process, will receive a premium, or be allowed to enter for competition.
