

pendently of Imperial or Provincial interests.

We understand that both the Government and the people of Canada would give the preference to the route by the valley of the St. John to St. John, and thence by the Bend to Halifax; and as this would be accomplished by the St. Andrews and Quebec and the European and North American Railway, both now under charter, without much further assistance being required from the Province, we do not see that more needs to be done than that these works should be prosecuted to completion with energy. As this will be really a 'Halifax and Quebec Railway,' running entirely through British Territory, we presume that the Imperial Guarantee may be as readily obtained for half its cost as for the whole. In such case, enough would be left to extend a branch line to Miramichi.

The Weather, since Monday last, when we had quite a snow storm, has been extremely cold for the season. On Wednesday morning the river below Fredericton was found to be frozen over, but during the day the ice gave way, and two Steamers reached the landing place. Yesterday morning the Steamers could not get far above Gagetown, and they returned to Indian Town with their passengers and freight.

This morning we had a slight fall of snow, with the wind from the North East, and the weather is more moderate than it has been for some days past.

A telegraph despatch from Fredericton this morning to the News Room states that the weather was moderate—snow was falling fast—and the ice running thick in the river—Wind North East.

At Quebec this morning, the wind was also North East, and snow falling thick.—Thermometer, 26.

The letters and papers by the Mail Steamer Cambria, reached this city this forenoon. The mails across the Bay are at present forwarded by sailing vessels, and the strong North winds have delayed them for some days past. An arrangement will no doubt be made for the conveyance of future English mails by the land route.

A Liverpool letter, dated 1st November says:—In general trade this has been as dull a week as we have had for a long period. The state of France, Austria and Italy, is the common topic of conversation, and people have made up their minds that there must be a general blow up on the Continent; and, as in most other cases of gloomy prognostication, we are suffering the evil by anticipation. The reply of Lord Palmerston to the Neapolitan Minister, has given great satisfaction to all parties, and inspires a confidence that the management of our foreign affairs is in safe and judicious hands.

The Steamer Commodore, which was run aground on the beach near McCoy's Head in the late gale, was towed into this harbour on Monday morning by the Steamer Creole. She will require some repairs, before resuming her trips on the Bay.—St. John Courier, Nov. 15.

West Indies.

Demerara.—An Envoy has been sent to the United States, for the purpose of inducing Immigration to the Colony from the free colored population of the Union.

Jamaica.—A serious riot between some of the military and civilians, occurred at Port Royal, on the night of the 10th ult, which resulted in several of the latter being much injured. It is said that some of the soldiers were indulging themselves in sport, when the constables interfered, and the young men of the town coming to the assistance of the latter, the soldiers were routed, but shortly after returned with a reinforcement with bayonets, and other arms.

Trinidad has followed the example of Demerara, and sent an Envoy to the United States for the purpose of obtaining Immigrants from the free colored population.

THE Northumberland Agricultural SOCIETY'S Annual Exhibition of Domestic Manufactures, Grains, DAIRY PRODUCE, GARDEN SEEDS, &c. &c., For 1851-2.

The Northumberland Agricultural Society's GENERAL EXHIBITION will take place in Chatham, on WEDNESDAY, the 21st day of January next.

The undermentioned Premiums are offered to Competition by the Society, for Articles, the "Produce of the Dairy, and Domestic Manufactures," and the undermentioned Prizes and Prizes, (both inclusive) for Grains, Garden Seeds, &c.

RULES AND REGULATIONS.

1. No premium shall be awarded for any article of Domestic Manufacture, or Produce of the Dairy, which has not been wholly manufactured and prepared for Exhibition within this County.

2. That all articles brought for Exhibition, must have been manufactured, raised or produced, within one year from the date of competition, (Cheese excepted.)

3. That the prizes for Domestic Manufactures shall be open to general competition; but persons who have won prizes of Ten Shillings and upwards for such manufactures

shall pay the annual Subscription of Five Shillings before receiving the said prizes.

5. That no price or prize be awarded for Grains, Garden Seeds, &c, nor any premium for Dairy Produce, except to Members of the Society, who have paid their annual subscription.

5. That all persons bringing for Exhibition, any article of Domestic Manufacture, Grain, or Dairy Produce, shall accompany the same with a statement setting forth that the Exhibitor is the owner of the article in question. If Domestic Manufactures—that the materials were produced, and the articles manufactured, prepared within the County during the preceding year! If Grain and Seeds—that the articles were raised by the Exhibitor on the premises occupied by him, during the past year, and were not exhibited for a premium on any former occasion: And if Dairy Produce, a similar statement subscribed, by the owner. These certificates to be handed to the Committee when the articles are being entered for Competition.

6. That no individual who is awarded the first prize on any article, shall be entitled to a second prize on the same description of article.

7. The Judges shall not withhold any premium on the ground, merely that the article is unworthy of a prize.

8. All articles to be exhibited by persons belonging to the Parish Chatham, Napan, and the neighboring Back Settlements; and all articles to be exhibited by persons belonging to the Parish of Newcastle, must be deposited in the hands of the Receiving Committee, Messrs. J. M. Johnson, William J. Fraser, and Henry Wyse, on the day preceding the Exhibition, and no article will be received by the Committee from persons residing at greater distances, after ten o'clock, on the morning of the 21st.

9. Instead of offering Premiums for the best samples of Clover and Timothy Seeds, and of Grain and Garden Seeds, &c, the Society now offers PRIZES for those articles, which prices include the premiums also.

10. No article of Grain or Seeds of any kind, which has undergone any chemical, or fire-drying process, will receive a premium, or be allowed to enter for competition.
