The Committee of the House of Assembly, appointed to take into consideration the proposition of the delegates from Canada for the construction of an intercolonial Railway, have reported that they are not prepared to recommend its acceptance.

We do not think it fair to ask Nova Scotia to be at any expense for the line beyond her own boundary, if it is to be directed in such a way as will give her trivial benefit in comparison with that derived by the other Provinces—especially New Brunswick—and the route proposed by the delegates would prove in several respects disadvantageous to the advantages derivable by the Province at large. Upon a question being put by Mr Marshall whether the government will have any state objection to the introduction of an Act of Incorporation and Facility Bill for constructing a Railway from Whitebaven towards New Brunswick," a discussion ensued between him and the Hon. Provincial Secretary, from which it appears that the latter has still hopes of the government measures being successful.
