

The sailor's Home, one of the noblest institutions in our midst, is a smouldering ruin; the Mariner's Church, a noble pile, lays in ashes. Over one hundred and fifty families are turned shelterless into the street, many of whom have barely saved the clothes on their bodies.—About six hundred persons are thus thrown at once upon the charities of our city. The Boylston School House one of the finest in the city, a most elegant building, is a heap of sad ruins. Several large blocks of houses are entirely destroyed.

NEW BRUNSWICK.

Melancholy Shipwrecks and Great Loss of Life!—Recent heavy gales in the Gulf of St. Lawrence have caused the destruction of a number of vessels, attended with melancholy loss of life. The barque Trusty, Capt. Foster, from Scarborough, Yorkshire for Quebec, with passengers, went ashore at a place called Ship Head off Gaspé, and eighteen lives were lost including five of the crew.

It is rumoured that in a recent hurricane in the Gulf of St. Lawrence, the schooner Alliance, armed by the British government for the protection of the fisheries perished near St. Paul's Island, with all on board; that fifteen schooners were lost in the vicinity of the Magdalen Islands, and that twenty two pilots have been drowned.

Nomination Day.—Yesterday was the day appointed for the nomination of Candidates for the vacant seat for this County in the General Assembly. After the reading of the law John Jordan, Esq., was nominated by James Brown, Esq., and seconded by Mr Joseph Lawrence; and William M. Howe Esq., was nominated by I. L. Bedell, Esq., and seconded by John Wishart, Esq.

The Candidates afterwards addressed those assembled at the Court House, explaining their views, and the course they should pursue if elected.—New Brunswicker.
