NOVA SCOTIA.

A most diabolical outrage was perpetrated in Bridgetown. An attempt was made to blow up the residence of R. James, Esq., a Magistrate of that place. The reason assigned is, that that gentleman has given several judgments against individuals for violation of the Licence Law. A public meeting was held, and a sum of money subscribed as a reward for the apprehension of the guilty parties, as well as to repair the building, which it appears received considerable damage.

The merchants of Halifax have memorialised Her Majesty on the subject of the fisheries. We have not room for this document to-day. The British North American in speaking of it says:

"It will be seen by the Memorial annexed, that our Merchants repudiate the idea of surrendering our Fishing Privileges for Reciprocal trade—justly deeming *Free Trade a fair equivalent for Free Trade*; and that our Fisheries must be retained as the inalienable right of the people of this Colony—a right or possession NEVER TO BE GIVEN UP on any pretence whatever.

We are glad to know that for the effectual protection of our Mackerel Fishery, the controversy about a line drawn from headland to headland will not come into dispute in any manner whatever. If the Americans are strictly kept outside of the limits of three miles from land, which they themselves recognize as the boundaries of the treaty they cannot take a single Mackerel, because this fine fish invariably skirts close to the shore, and cannot be "trolled" out with bait while the Americans are kept 3 miles off.

It should also be known widely, that for many years past, American Fishermen who catch Mackerel, fraudulently obtain a bounty by fitting out under a Cod License, under which, only, a bounty can be legally obtained in the United States. They should therefore catch their cod—pocket the bounty—and let our Mackerel alone.

New Fishing Project.—The Halifax Sun says:—We have it, on credible authority, that a company is in prospect, contemplating the carrying on of the Cod and Mackerel Fisheries upon an extensive scale, from one or more harbors on the Southern and Eastern shores of Cape Breton—very probably, from the every way most eligible, spacious and convenient port of Louisbourg.

If we understand the scheme aright, the American Company propose to carry on the fisheries in British bottoms manned by Colonial fishermen, at an original outlay of some £20,000, N. S. currency. We may fairly look our Colonial Legislature for encouragement to such an undertaking.

NEW BRUNSWICK.

We learn by telegraph that Mr Webster and Mr Crampton, the British Minister, (who has been Mr Webster's guest for the last ten days at Marshfield, in Massachusetts) will leave that place this afternoon for Washington, where it is hoped, an arrangement will at once be completed for settling this fishery question, and some other questions of an interesting character now pending between the United States and the North American Colonies, in a manner satisfactory to all parties.

No other vessel but the steam frigate Mississippi is to be sent to our waters at present, as will be seen by the following extract from the New York Journal of Commerce:—

The U. S. steam frigate Mississippi, bearing the broad pennant of Commodore Perry, sailed from New York on Saturday forenoon, for the fishing grounds off the British Provinces, whither she has been ordered by the Government. The report that other vessels have been actually ordered to the same region is not confirmed, though it is doubtless true that directions have been given to hold them in readiness. This mission of the Mississippi will, it is believed, be shortly accomplished, and will not interfere with her connection with the Japan expedition. The Commodore was received on board Saturday morning by the splendid band, and a salute fired before the steamer got under way. The Commodore and officers were attended on board by a large number of friends.

Information has been received in this city, that the Mississippi will call at Eastport, and probably visit this port. We have no doubt our citizens will give Commodore Perry and his officers a hospitable reception.—*St. John New Brunswick.*
