UNITED STATES.

The Yellow Fever prevails at Charleston.

The Gloucester Telegraph says that the returns of mackerel at that port for the year past fall short full one half of what the receipts were at this time last year.

This is owing mainly to the troubles with the English. The prospects for the remainder of the season, is not very favorable and if those vessels now out of return with more than is anticipated.

The following is the latest intelligence from Havana:

The Empire City has arrived with advices to the 19th. Arrests were being made daily, throughout the island, of parties supposed to be connected with the Fillibusters. A council of war was to be held on the 23d for the trial of the eleven prisoners concerned in the publication of the *Voice of the People*. The Government has received intelligence that 1,200 had been seized by the military authorities in the vicinity. The remainder were carried to the mountains and secreted by the country people. All American papers, without exception, are prohibited, and spies swarmed in every direction. The Captain General had stationed troops in all parts of the island, and was making vigorous exertions to suppress the least attempt at insurrection. The steamer Pizarro had proved a total loss. The officers of the Empire City were politely treated by the Spanish authorities.

Another Prize.—Her Majesty's Steamship Devastation, Commander Campbell, made a prize of the American Schooner Caroline Knight of Newburyport, on Monday, the 13th inst, for a violation of the treaty. The prize is a very fine schooner of 100 tons, and is said to be worth about \$4000. She had on board about 250 barrels of mackerel.

We are much pleased to be enabled to announce to our readers that 330 bundles of telegraph wire arrived in this port on Thursday last, in the bark Closina, from Liver pool. This wire is intended to connect this island with Cape Tormentine, in the shape of a submarine telegraph, and next spring we understand, it will be carried from East Point to Newfoundland.—Islander.

UNITED STATES.

A splendid dinner has been given to the Hon. Thos Baring, of London, by the citizens of Boston. The Mayor presided, and gave a cordial welcome to the distinguished representative of the mercantile class of England, to which Mr Brown responded in the most appropriate style.

NOVA SCOTIA.

Mackerel.—We understand that schools of small Mackerel have entered Halifax Harbour and the Bays and Harbours on our Western shore, in great abundance. The fishermen hail these tinny fish as the pioneers of the fat fall Mackerel which are sure to follow. Heaven send, that our Fishery may be abundant, for in truth, our people require it.
