CANADA.

Shiwreck on Lake Huron.—A melancholy shipwreck has taken place on Lake Huron. Mr A. Macdonald, formerly of Gnelph, some time ago succeeded to the Hon. Wm. Cayley, and Mr W. Elliott, of Niagara, infcarrying on the extensive Fisheries on Lake Huron. In the herining of December 1988. the beginning of December, Mr Macdonald, accompanied by two brothers named Martindale, sailed from Goderich harbor in the small schooner 'Saucy Jack,' laden with flour for Saugeen. During the severe storms of the month she went ashore, but was got off, and on the i4th sailed for the Saugeen. Next morning the unfortunate vessel (says the Siron the i4th sailed for the Saugeen. Next morning the unfortunate vessel (says the Signal) was found stranded on the beach about five miles below Saugeen, and one of the crew, the elder of the brothers, lying in the cabin much bruised and hurt, and many of the bags of flour scattered along the beach.—It is supposed that in attempting to make the mouth of the river Saugeen, the vessel had struck on the reef outside the island, and those on board finding themselves in danger had thrown the greater part of the carrow over. those on board finding themselves in danger had thrown the greater part of the cargo overboard; that while thus engaged, the masts had been carried away and hurt the man found in the cabin, and she must then have capsized, as the rigging was found wound round her. As far as we can learn, Mr Macdonald's body has not been found. This melancholy occurrence has hast a great gloom over the place, as Mr Macdonald was a young man well known and generally esteemed.—The elder of the brothers Martindale has left a wife and two children, the younger was married only a few weeks since. A female relation, whose husband was lost a short time previous, occupied the same house with the Martindales at Southampton, now tenantthe Martindales at Southampton, now tenanted by three widows.
