NEW BRUNSWICK.

Military.—On Saturday last Major General the Hon. C. Gore, Commander in Chief of the Forces in the lower Colonies, arrived in this City in the steamer Pilot, from Annapolis, and was received with the usual formalities. Yesterday this distinguished officer reviewed the Troops in this Garrison, and we understand, expressed himself much pleased with their efficiency and general deportment.—*New Brunswick.*

CANADA.

Messrs. Jackson, Ross, and Capt. Rhodes, have returned to Quebec, accompanied by the Hon. Mr. Grey of New Brunswick.

Amongst the notices of motions which were to have been moved last night, we perceive the following:

Hon. Mr. Young—Enquiry of Ministry whether it is the intention of the Government to bring before this House during the present session, any resolution or measure, or series of resolutions or measures, on the subject of the establishment of a retaliatory policy against the productions of the United States of America, or for the purpose of levying preferential or discriminating duties on certain goods imported via the St. Lawrence, and favor of that route, or for the purpose of levying higher Tolls on American vessels passing through the Welland Canal than on British vessels, and it so, at what period of the Session.

By Mr. Cauchon—For a Committee of the whole to take into consideration the following resolution:—

That the Railroad from Quebec to Halifax, as forming part of the Grand Provincial Railroad, ought to be constructed in connexion and simultaneously with that part of the same road which passes through the section of the country comprised between Quebec and Toronto.

And to be moved this evening:—

Hon. Mr. Drummond—Bill for reforming the Municipal System of Lower Canada, and for establishing County, Parish or Township and Village Municipalities therein.—the said Bill to be intitled 'The Lower Canada Municipalities Act.'

Hon. Mr. Drummond—Bill to amend and consolidate the Road Laws of Lower Canada, the said Bill to be intitled 'The Lower Canada Road Act.'

Canadian Legislature.—Thursday, Oct. 7.—Mr Christie moved the House into Committee of the whole to take into consideration the expediency of completing the Highway between Gaspé Basin and the Restigouche, by erecting the bridges at the Provincial expense, and of an humble Address to His Excellency, recommending the subject to His Excellency's consideration.

Mr Hincks opposed the motion on the ground that ministers had not sanctioned this grant, and that therefore, the question could not be entertained by the House. They were however glad to hear what could be said on this and similar subjects, and would judge accordingly. When the estimates came down, if they did not satisfy the hon. member he would be at liberty to ensure them.

Mr Christie withdrew his report, but in doing so contended that some improvements ought to be made in Gaspé, where not only the roads were bad, but the jails disgraceful to humanity.

Legislative Council.—Resolutions to be proposed in the Legislative Council, by the Hon. Thomas McKay, on Monday, the 18th day of October instant:

Resolved, 1st. That the present Constitution of this House is defective.

2nd. That the introduction of Responsible Government into the Province, and the power appointing members being vested virtually in the executive Council, most of the members of which are leaders of the majority in the Legislative Assembly, have rendered this House a mere reflex of the sentiments of the House of Assembly; and that this House is no longer that check upon undue or oppressive legislation, which it ought to be for the public liberty and welfare.

3d. That at present, as there is but little sympathy existing between the Legislative Council and the people; this House is in favor of its own dissolution, with a view to its being reorganised upon some better constitutional principle.

4th. That an Address, founded on these Resolutions, be presented to His Excellency the Governor General.

Legislative Council.—Wednesday, 6th Oct.—Ordered, That there be a call of the House on Monday, the eighteenth day of October instant.

Railroads.—Mr Jackson who has lately returned from a tour through the Lower Provinces, where he has been fetted like a Prince everywhere he appeared, and hailed as the benefactor of this country, has been so delighted with the country along the south shore along the St. Lawrence, below Quebec, as to have suggested the taking of immediate steps for the construction of a railroad between this city and the lower Provinces.

The Mercury says, it learns from a reliable source, that it is in contemplation to remove the military head quarters, from Montreal to this city.—*Quebec Gazette* October 8.

UNITED STATES.

Railway Accident.—Concord N. H., Oct. 7.—8 P. M.—A terrible accident occurred today on the Montreal Railroad near the Wier's steamboat landing, by which 6 persons were killed and from 12 to 16 dangerously injured. An extra train was coming from the steamboat Dover, at Meredith Village, with a large number of passengers on their way to the State Fair at Meredith Bridge. Soon after it started a coupling broke, while on a spike bridge near the wiers. Before the accident could be repaired, another extra train from steamer Dover ran into it, and a most heart rending scene ensued.

A number of platform cars were jammed together and great injury to life ensued.

The forward train it is now said, was stopping to take up tickets. Many jumped into the water, which was fifteen feet deep. Governor Martin was on board, but was uninjured.

A lady named Evans was killed at Sanborton bridge to day by the cars, in attempting to take her child from the train.

Another woman named Lord, was killed by a horse running away with a gig, at the Fair ground, near Meredith.

Defalcation in New York.—The New York Express gives the following particulars of the embezzlement case in that city:—

The business circles of the City have been astounded to-day by news of the abstraction of about \$220,000 from Brown, Brothers & Co. The parties implicated have hitherto stood well in the community, and have been esteemed as men of unblemished character. The principal person implicated is George W. Bowen, cashier in the house of Brown, Brothers & Co., and a son of one of the partners in that house.

SUNDAY'S MAIL.

NEW BRUNSWICK.

The Provincial Exhibition opened at Fredericton on Tuesday morning. The city was crowded with visitors, more strangers being present than on any former occasion. The hotelkeepers and others did all in their power to accommodate persons from abroad, who occupied every available nook and corner.

Tuesday opened with a cloudy sky, and during the procession, which was formed of the Masonic Lodge of Fredericton, the Engine Companies Nos. 1 and 6, of this city, and the Portland Company, together with a number of the inhabitants of Fredericton, the rain descended in torrents, and thus cut short this interesting portion of the display. On arriving at the Exhibition building, which skirts the river, the entrance being from Queen Street, the assembled multitude was greeted with the National Anthem, sung by a choir of Amateurs in a most effective manner, being accompanied by the excellent band of the 72d Highlanders. His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor arriving at the same time was received by a salute from the Royal Artillery.

His Honor Judge Street delivered an Address which was replied to by His Excellency in beautiful manner, who eulogised this display of native industry, and pointed out its beneficial effects in a very forcible manner. The building was filled to its utmost capacity, a large number of ladies being present.

We learn by telegraph that the Exhibition has since been crowded with visitors, and thus far has met the greatest encouragement, the display being in the highest degree satisfactory. The productions generally, but especially those from this city, have won general admiration.—*New Brunswick.*

WEST INDIES.

Earthquake in Cuba.—We continue to receive accounts of the disastrous effects of the earthquake at St. Jago de Cuba, last month. Nearly all the churches were dreadfully shaken. One of the towers of the Cathedral was thrown down, and the church of Santa Anna was rent in four pieces. At the barracks of St. Frances the earth spened with a fearful gap, and swallowed up a corporal and two soldiers. In the first quarter of the city of St. Jago, one hundred and fifty houses were ruined; in the second quarter seventy two were destroyed. In the direction of Limones, it was reported that a volcano had made an eruption. Rocks were rent assunder from the tops of mountains, and fell into the plains with a terrible power.—*Boston paper.*
