It appears, that out of 3,097,358 souls which compose the population of New York, 2,439,296 were born in the United States; 84,820 in England; 343,111 in Ireland; 31,000 in Scotland and Wales; 118,398 in Germany; 47,200 in British America; and that the number of residents of foreign birth in all the State is 658,662,—or about two-ninths of the whole people.—*New York Tribune.*

The Washington National Intelligencer states that the Hon. Edward Everett has been appointed to succeed the lamented Daniel Webster as Secretary of State.

DEATH OF A JEW AT THE POOR HOUSE.—An insane Jew died at the House of Industry last week, at the age of 30 years. This is the first Jew that ever became a public charge in the city of Boston.

The owners of the steamer Admiral have commenced a suit against the owners of the steamer Eastern State, for \$6,000 damages for the injury received by the late collision in this harbour.

NEW BRUNSWICK.

REMARKABLE PASSAGE.—The ship *Runnymede*, built at this port by Messrs. Smith & Haws, has made the passage from Liverpool to Australia in the remarkably short run of seventy-two days, being by three days the shortest on record. So much for New-Brunswick built ships. She is now owned by a firm in Liverpool.

STILL OPEN.—If our memory be correct, it was on this date last year (10th) that the St. John river was frozen over, although we believe it opened again shortly afterwards for one or two days—the great snow storm, the greatest of the winter, also happened on the 10th. To the present time we have not had more than two heavy frosts; and it is very likely that the river will not be closed during this month. We have watched the state of the thermometer in New York, as noted in the Herald, and observe that during the month of October, and up to the latest date, (5th inst.) the thermometer has averaged 70 in the shade, equal to our hottest summer weather. It is said that when a winter is late setting in, in this Province, an early Spring is sure to follow. The present bids fair to be one of the most open winters known to our climate.—*St. John News.*

The first of Cunard's new screw steamships from Liverpool to New York, Jamaica and Charges, is advertised to sail on the 8th of December.—Her name is the *Andes*, and she will be followed by the *Alps*, *Etoa*, *Jura*, *Tauris*, and *Caucasus*.

SUDDEN DEATH.—A man named Mullen, a Pedlar from Miramich, died suddenly last night in Mr Wm. Grieve's Boarding House. He had just taken tea, after which he in a few moments lay back, and ceased to breathe.—*Fredericton Reporter.*

A despatch from Woodstock, received yesterday, states that the water in the river has risen over three feet, and was still rising. At the Tobique it is still higher.—*New Brunswick.*

NOVA SCOTIA.

The Cape Breton News rejoices to learn that a small quantity of Mackerel had been taken in the nets off Main-a-dieu, during the last three days of the past week. The prospects of a tolerably fair catch was very promising. We sincerely hope that a bountiful supply may be secured to repay the hardy fishermen for their toilsome labours, which had been unsuccessful previous to the period we refer to.—*Halifax Sun.*

SUNDAY'S MAIL.

RICHBUCTO.—During the gale of the 15th ult., John Marshall, master of the schooner *Relief* of this port, on his homeward passage from Boston, unfortunately fell overboard, and sad to relate met a watery grave. The vessel was running about nine knots when the accident occurred, every effort was made to save him but without success. Mr Marshall was a man of the strictest integrity, and will be much missed in this place. He has left an only daughter to mourn her irreparable loss, and leaves a large circle of relatives and acquaintances to lament his sudden and melancholy end. He was a native of England, but for many years back a resident of this place, and a branch pilot for the port.

UNITED STATES.

Wreck of the Mobile.—Intelligence has reached Liverpool of the total loss of the American Ship *Mobile*, and 60 lives. She was on her passage from Mobile for New Orleans when the disaster occurred.

The erection of the first pillar of the Crystal Palace took place in New York on Saturday. About two thousand persons were present, among whom were Gen. Hunt, Archbishop Hughes, the mayor of New York,

and many other distinguished gentlemen.—Several speeches were made.

The Lake Shore Railroad is nearly completed between Erie and Cleveland, and when it is done, there will be a continuous line of railroad from Boston to Cleveland, by way of Buffalo, Dunkirk, and Erie.

WEST INDIES.

Intelligence from St. John's, Porto Rico states that from the heavy rains the River at Aguaba had overflowed its banks and swept away about 200 persons.

The hurricane of the 25th and 26th ult. was severely felt at St. Thomas and Porto Rico. At the former place a French ship and a Spanish brig were lost, and an American ship and a Spanish sloop, were lost at Guiana in the latter Island. The gale also was felt at St. John's: it was of but short duration and did not cause any damage.

A most terrific thunder storm, visited Hamilton, on the 1st inst.—The electric fluid struck the house of the late Hon G. Hunt, passed through the drawing room and destroyed a Piano forte upon which a young lady was playing but did her no injury.
