

ces of the whole affair. The Daring being detained by head winds and thick weather, did not leave until Monday morning, and these gentlemen proceeded by land on Saturday.

In the mean time the *Sovereign*, Capt. Foote, Esq., of this place, one of those detained, arrived here yesterday morning with the intelligence that all the vessels had been permitted to leave, some with and others without their papers, and that they had gone out fishing on Thursday and Friday last. The whole matter is somewhat incomprehensible, and it is impossible to offer any opinion on its merits until farther developments are made. We think it very probable that it will be found in the end that Commander Campbell had some good and strong reasons inducing him to act as he has done.—*Pictou Chronicle*.

NEW BRUNSWICK EXHIBITION.—We are not very desirous of unnecessarily lauding the efforts of our New Brunswick neighbours in regard to the present position and prospects of their noble Province, but we cannot help thinking that much credit is due to them for the active energies recently put forth in this and other important movements, calculated materially to advance the general welfare. Four years ago, and New Brunswick was suffering heavily from an almost universal depression, occasioned partly by the repeated failure of crops, but still more, and chiefly from a heavy shock in the commercial world, in which that Province largely participated. Since then, however, by renewed activity, perseverance, and industry on the part of her inhabitants, both in commerce and in agriculture, the whole business of the country has received a fresh impetus, and assumed a flourishing aspect; two Industrial Exhibitions have already been held within the Province; and there is every prospect of railroad inter-communication being speedily established in New Brunswick, connecting her with the trade of the prosperous and growing Province of Canada, and with the United States. And now, if her farmers but produce a systematic course in regard to the selection of stock and seed, the disposal of manures, and the rotation of crops, there is little doubt but that New Brunswick will take her stand, in point of agricultural productions, as second to none of the British American Colonies.—*Halifax Pres. Witness*.

CANADIAN LIBERALITY.—We perceive by our exchanges, that Judge Aylwin, of Canada East, has contributed £1,000 to rebuild St. Thomas' Church, Montreal, and has offered £75 per annum, for the support of its Clergyman. It is pleasing to see such evidences thickening on every hand, both of the will and the ability, to minister to the necessities of the Church, now that extraneous resources are at a great extent withdrawn.—*Halifax Church Times*.

CANADA.

The talk about town is that there are difficulties in the cabinet and that either Mr Hincks or Mr Morin must resign; and that Lord Elgin is recalled, and will be succeeded by Lord Harris. Should the last rumour prove true, Lord Elgin's removal will be regretted, for His Lordship has done very much to promote the prosperity of the province and his personal popularity has been possibly greater than that of any Governor of Canada.—*Quebec Chronicle*.

UNITED STATES.

FUNERAL OBSQUIES.—The Funeral of Daniel Webster, attended by thousands of citizens from this and other States took place yesterday at Marshfield, and his ashes now repose in a spot hallowed by his presence whilst living—secured as the inheritance of his posterity—and evermore enshrined in the hearts of his mourning countrymen as being the last resting place of America's great statesman, patriot, and orator. We believe there are but few of all the citizens of this wide republic that would not eagerly avail themselves of an opportunity to make a pilgrimage to the tomb of Daniel Webster. But of all the tributes of affection now paid to him there are none upon which we delight more to dwell than the marks of genuine respect emanating from those who were of his political opponents. Witness the resolutions passed in Faneuil Hall, a beautiful tribute to departed worth and genius moved by a member of the great rival party to that of which Mr Webster was the Sun and centre. We observe the leading newspapers of the same party in mourning, and with expressions of unfeigned sorrow for the great bereavement, eulogise his worth. Many of the Flags in weeping drapery that are to be seen on nearly every street, are from the same source. These manifestations of sympathy and affection are creditable to the hearts of the American nation, and show that however much political differences may sever the living, the grave, throws its ægis over all asperities of feeling silences the voice of faction, and evokes a

tribute from the finer and purer feelings of our nature.

Our streets have been thronged with strangers for the last few days who have come to witness the funeral decorations of the city, and mingled their griefs with those of our sorrowing citizens, amid scenes so inseparably associated with all that was good and great of him that has just been gathered to his fathers, and where so many touching moments are bearing sweet incense to his memory.

The public buildings, hotels, stores, and other places of business, are very generally arrayed in mourning, as are also many of the private dwellings. Innumerable flags with the insignia of mourning have been unfurled to the breeze along our every street, most of them bearing some appropriate inscription.

The buildings for a great distance along Washington street are all faced with mourning drapery, festooned, or in loose pendant folds, presenting one prolonged row of mortuary emblems.

It was found on a post mortem examination that Mr Webster died of disease of the liver. The immediate cause of death was Hemorrhage from the stomach and bowels, owing to a morbid state of the blood consequent upon the above disease. There was also dropsy of the abdomen.

SUNDAY'S MAIL.

NOVA SCOTIA.

William Rhodes Esqr. of Quebec, has subscribed the munificent sum of £1,000, to the Quebec and New Brunswick Junction Railway.

The Quebec papers state that Mr Baring, the representative of the Banking House of Baring and Brothers, London, was expected to visit that city. Great preparations were in progress to give him a grand reception.

The Bill to incorporate the Grand Trunk Railway Company of Canada has passed the second reading and been referred to the standing Committee on Railways.

Another Prize.—H. M. Steamer Basalisk, Capt. Hon. F. Egerton, arrived on Saturday afternoon from a cruise to the Coast of Newfoundland.

Railway Statistics.—A very able document prepared by A. C. Moon Esq., as consulting Engineer on behalf of this Province, and addressed to the Government, was laid before the House on Tuesday last, and ordered to be printed in the daily journals. Mr Morton states his decided opinion, that considering the superior character of the railway to be built in this province, the price agreed upon with the contractors is very reasonable.

UNITED STATES.

The death of Daniel Webster is con firmed and the event will have no small degree of influence in shaping out the grand result of the Presidential election which is near at hand.

Late and important from Washington!—Reciprocity and the Fisheries.—The President has resolved to take into his own hands the negotiations respecting reciprocity and the fisheries, and called on the Secretary of the Treasury to assist him. It is hoped the business may be put in shape for the action of Congress nearly next Session.

WEST INDIES.

The Island of Cuba, we learn, continues in a state of great excitement. Arrests, outrages and suspicion seem to increase day by day.

Another conspiracy had been discovered in Matanzas, and the Military Tribunal had left Havana for that town. Still another conspiracy was discovered at Pinar del Rio, for which place Jose Rives, son of the convict Rives who discovered the conspiracy of Juan Gonzales, left immediately.
