The Legislature having passed a grant of £500 in aid of the funds of the Society, to provide for the expenses of getting up and managing the proposed Exhibition, &c., thereby showing their approval of the same, upon the plan and contemplated arrangements contained in the resolutions of the Society passed at the general meeting held on the 16th of October and 7th of February last, which have all been heretofore published and widely circulated thro'out the Province, the Executive Commit-tee are now actively engaged in the prepa-rations requisite to carry out the scheme, and all local Committees for the different Counties in the Province; the General Committee, consisting of the Legislative Council and members of the House of Assembly, in their private capacities, in their respective Counties; the several County Agricultural Societies and Mechanics' Institutes in the different parts of the Pro-vince; Manufacturing Companies, and all Agriculturists, Horticulturists, Manufacturers, Mechanics, Artisans and Artists throughout the country; and all other persons taking an interest in its welfare and prosperity, are now called on to be up and doing in aid of this great work, as no time is to be lost in preparing articles to be brought forward for competition, and rais-ing subscriptions in aid of the funds neces-sary to provide for the large expenses that must be incurred

It will be seen by the schedule and classified list of the objects for the Exhibition, already published, that it will be open to all the natural productions, both mineral and vegetable, of the Province; to all kinds of agricultural produce; to all articles of aome manufacture of every description; to cattle, horses, sheep, pigs, poultry, and cured meats of all kinds; and to specimens of all the different branches of the fine

Farmers, Gardeners, Manufacturers, Musical Instrument Makers, Jewellers, Watch and Clockmakers, Carpenters, Watch and Clockmakers, Carpenters, Wheelwrights, Blacksmiths, Whitesmiths, Founders, Mill Owners, Carriage Builders, Boot and Shoe Makers, Saddlers, Harness Makers, and indeed all descriptions of Medical Makers, and Indeed all Makers chanics, Artisans and Artists, are all there-fore strongly invited to come forward, with the respective productions of their industry, labour, skill, ingenuity and ability, in their different callings, for a generous competi-tion with each other for excellence, and thus shew what the resources of the Province are, and what the people in it can do. The Ladies of the Province are also solicited to exert their talents and ingenuity in fancy and ornamental work for the Show.

Liberal Prizes will be awarded to the vicors in this praiseworthy rivalship, a list of which will be hereafter published as soon as it can be prepared and arranged. Pecuniary assistance to a limited amount, so far as funds will permit, will be placed at the disposal of the respective Local Committees for Councies at a distance from Fredericton, to afford aid to such persons as may be in need of the same, in the expenses of transmitting their articles for competition to the Exhibition; and the more liberal the subscription from such Counties are, the greater will be the amount to which such aid can be extended to them.

The Exhibition will be opened by His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor in person, on Tuesday the 5th of October next, and closed on Saturday the 9th, during which time a Fair will be held with the Exhibition, at which Ploughing Matches, Regattas, and various kinds of public amusements and sports will be bereafter provided, as the object is to make this great Exhibition a show not only highly beneficial to the Province at large, and thus carry out the most important objects of the Society, but also instructive and amusing to all who attend.

The use of the Province Building has been kindly granted to the Society for the occasion, in which all articles of a nature to require great care, safe keeping, and

protection from the weather, will be placed.

Every exertion will be made to provide the means of comfortable accommodation in Fredericton and its immediate vicinity,

#### AUSTRALIA.

There were three arrivals in the Thames on Monday from the Australian colonies,—the Albert, the Bolivar, and the Blackfriar. The Albert brings dates to the 20th of December, or about a fortnight's later news, and she has 33,000 ounces of gold on board, valued at about £120,000. The Blackfriar has 11,052 ounces, valued at about £40,000. The gold fields were producing some very rich specimens. One called the Great Australian Nugget, weighing gross 341 5 oz. dwts, and estimated to contain 336 ounces of pure gold. mated to contain 336 ounces of pure gold, had attracted crowds of persons to see it, and the result was, that a great number of persons at once proceeded to the digging. This lump had been sold at public auction for the sum of £1,155. A second and exceedingly rich specimen of gold in the matrix, weighing ninety ounces, was spoken of as unsurpassed by anything yet found. It was obtained at Louisa Creek. A third nugget, weighing eighty-two ounces, discovered two miles from the Turon, about a foot below the surface, is described as a very wonderful specimen. In one day the receipts at Melbourne had been 16,333

The Australian Government had raised the price of licenses for the diggings from 30s. to £30 per month.

It was found almost impossible to retain

any one at an ordinary occupation. A recommendation from the Lieutenant Gover-nor for a large increase in the pay of all the inferior Government employés had been carried by a vote of 17 to 10.

There is enough in the accounts to show

that emigrants have not only some good fortune to hope for, but that there are also dangers and temptations. "The present system of indiscriminate digging is calculated to produce the habit of gambling." "We are sorry to learn that many of the diggers spend their Sundays at Braidwood in drunkenness and riot." Such like remarks are tacked to the fag-end of every marks are tacked to the fag-end of every letter from the gold districts. Crime, too, is rife among the miners. "Robberies." Robberies is rife among the miners. says one paper, "are becoming fashionable in the Victoria gold fields." One poor fellow had 62 oz. stolen from him on Saturday last; another £30 in notes; another man had his tent cu: open, but the robbers missed the purse. As for horse-stealing, it has become so common that it is thought little of, except by the sufferers." The Melbourne Daily News states that "a number of diggers have come to the thwn for the purpose of buying fire arms. They have no protection on which they can depend, and they intend to keep in small bodies for their own protection. The diggings on an evening present a most extraordinary scene, much resembling a party who apprehend a surprise. Most of the diggers are armed to the teeth, and volley upon volley is fired, it being a rule to dis-charge and reload after six o'clock every

evening.
At the Ballarad diggings crime is fearfully on the increase. The diggers there are surrounded by a gang of vagabonds. They are altogether unprotected. The police are awed by the amount of crime, and
