REPORT

Of the Blackville, Blissfield, and Lud-low District Agricultural Society, for

The Committee of the Blackville, Blissfield, and Ludlow District Agricultural Society, beg to submit the following Report to the members of the Society.

The past summer has been distinguished by a lowness of temperature which seldom occurs, at that season, in this Province. In consequence of this circumstance, all grain, when not early sown, and many kinds of valuable crop, at whatever time planted, did not reach maturity except in favorable situations. The potatoe blight has also again fallen upon our fields, yet in a form so mitigated as may reasonably lead to the opinion that it is gradually disappearing. The deficiency in the potatoe crop is, however, by no means inconsiderable.

In all places, but especially in new settlements, these occurrences are severely felt. They do not, however, afford just grounds for peculiar discouragement, or for gloomy repining. Such events happen at intervals to every people, in all climates; and, while they serve to show our dependance on the Supreme Being, they are indeed only a part of that infinite Leonomy which orders all things for the general good. Whether we observe the cultivated field or the unbroken wilderness, we find that scarcely any two successive years are alike productive of every kind either of fruit or seed; while the exhausting fungus, and the destroying insect, fasten in common upon the most cherished food of man, and upon the most worthless weed. In the present instance, the peculiarity of the summer has not led to any deficiency in our principal crops. The returns from Grass, Wheat, and Oats, are not only equal to the common average, but above it, in numerous instances, where seasonable care and attention has been exercised.

In the allotment of premiums, and in the general application of the funds of the Society, the Committee has pursued a course similar to that which was adopted last year. Impressed with the importance of obtaining an improved breed of Stock, of increasing the number and quality of our home manufactures, and of encouraging a more careful and extended cultivation of the various crops which are suitable to our soil and climate, their efforts have been chiefly directed towards these objects. The subject of the introduction of labor-saving implements of husbandry, has not been overlooked by the Committee, but they have reluctantly concluded that it would be premature, at this period, to expend the funds of the Society in furnishing any implements of the kind, as those which are most essential, in the present state of our

fields, are already in general use.

The contributions, in subscriptions and donations, to the fauds of the Society, during the past year, have amounted to £30 10 0, which sum, in addition to the Provincial grant of £91 10 0, and a balance of £31 10 7, previously in the hands of the Treasurer, makes an aggregate of £153 10 7, which your Committee have had at

To the inhabitants of this District no little credit is due for the prompt and zealous manner in which they have responded to the liberality of the Legislature. Among the contributions, the Committee have gratefully to acknowledge the receipt from Alexander McLaggan, Esq., of the kind and liberal donation of £7 7-6.

The Ploughing Match took place at Mr Decantillon's farm, on the first day of October. The competitors were numerous, and their comparative skill was tested with

and their comparative skill was tested with great spirit and ability. Six Prizes were awarded; the first having been obtained by a native ploughman.

An Exhibition of Agricultural Implements, made in the District, and an Exhibition of Cattle, also took place on the same day, and at the same place. Your Committee regret that so little comparation as mittee regret that so little competition appeared in the display of agricultural implements, and trust that a better spirit, in this ments, and trust that a better spirit, in this respect, will be manifested hereafter. The specimens of Stock exhibited were numerous, and creditable to the District, but not, with a few exceptions, of so good a quality as had been anticipated. He vever, as the Committee has this year introduced into the District, at great cost, and distributed among the members of the Society, on easy terms, three Bulls, two Boars, and four Rams, of superior breed, it is hoped that the show of Cattle will, in future, be worthy of higher commendation.

The Society's Exhibition of Home Manufactures, Produce of the Dairy, and Grain, was held at Mr Decantillon's, on the 7th

was held at Mr Decantillon's, on the 7th day of January, 1852. The show of Wool-len products, and of Butter and Cheese, len products, and of Butter and Cheese, was highly gratifying. There are evident signs of gradual improvement in these important branches of industry. Numerous samples of Grain were exhibited, which were all excellent of their kind. The heaviest Wheat weighed 66 lbs.; of Buckwheat, 54½ lbs.; Barley, 52½ lbs.; Oats, 50½ lbs.; Pease 68½ lbs. to the bushel.

All the meetings of the Society have been well attended during the year.

Passing by many subjects of less importance, the Committee would carnestly direct the attention of Farmers to the expediency of adopting the general use of Swamp Mud in making Compost, but more especially in the preparation of a top-dressing for their exhausted meadows. This valuable substance abounds on the Miramichi, and seems to afford the only Miramichi, and seems to afford the only

available means of restoring, in a short time, the wasted strength of our fields.

It should be continually kept in view that this Society has been formed, not only to encourage, but also to improve, the Agri-culture and the Home Manufactures of the District in which we reside: to do by combined energy, and from a common fund, that which could not or would not be done by individual exertion alone. Our objects are, as we have already manifested in some little degree, to promote and to reward a more skilful and careful system of Agriculture, both as to the manner of cultivation, and as to the means employed in it; to en-courage the due preparation and more ex-tended application of Manures not generally known, as well as to introduce better maangement in saving and in applying those which are now in common use; to obtain and to spread the best Seed of all kinds; to introduce Cattle of the most approved breeds, along with the most judicious modes of treatment in relation to them; to expand and to render more perfect our Home Manufactures; to elicit, and mutually to impart instruction, and to promote a generous competition in all useful productions. If these objects are steadily and vigorously pursued, a great amount of good will necessarily result from our exertions, while on the contrary, faint and ineffective measures will only end in disappointment. But it depends on Farmers at large whether the greatest degree of benefit shall accrue from this Society. An ambitious, observant, indefatigable, and zealous spirit among the people, co-operating with us, can alone ensure a full measure of success. If they are supine and unaspiring, negligent of improvement, and prone to be disheartened at a few ordinary failures; or if their zeal abates, while yet the work before us is hardly begun, then indeed will but little progress be made, and prosperity will not be attained.
