

SUNDAY'S MAIL.

This mail which was due here at 8 o'clock yesterday morning, did not arrive until this morning (Monday) at 8 o'clock.

CANADA.—Due regard was paid by our citizens yesterday, to the obsequies of the Iron Duke. The busy wheels of commerce stood still, shops were closed, minute guns fired—83, corresponding with the years of deceased hero—Divine Service was performed in the English Cathedral—the few ships remaining in the harbour displayed their bunting at half mast, and altogether the day was observed in a manner creditable to our ancient city.—Quebec Gazette.

NEW BRUNSWICK.—A Correspondent of the St. John Times, writing from Fredericton on Wednesday evening, says—A public meeting takes place this evening, the citizens having been called together by the Mayor and Common Council, to express their views in reference to the purchase of 'The Grove,' and the more effectual lighting of the streets by gas. This is the way we do business in Fredericton. The Corporation Body have during the past season, repaired streets, turnpiked new streets, laid down side walks, built two good and substantial wharves, erected twenty posts and lamps for gas, &c. and it is now proposed to erect some additional lamp-posts, and purchase that delightful shady spot (some 12 or 15 acres) hitherto known as Odell's Grove, which will be thrown open to the citizens as a drive, promenade, and pleasure ground through all time to come.

UNITED STATES.—About half past 12 o'clock yesterday morning, at Worcester, a fire was discovered in the Worcester County House (prison) in the North wing. It originated in the furnace which by excessive heat, communicated to the air box, and thence to the wood work. The flames spread with destructive rapidity, and before they could be arrested, the smoke and heat ascended to the cells above, where were confined twenty-nine lunatics, sent there in consequence of the crowded state of the hospital. All but four were taken out alive.

Their bodies presented a most ghastly appearance, and indicated an amount of suffering previous to death, which of course it is impossible to depict. Their heart-rending cries were heard high over the rage of the destroying flame, and the noise and excitement of the thrilling fearful occasion.

Although the Fire Department was on the ground at an early hour, yet the conflagration had attained a great headway before discovery; and although some of the cells in which the unfortunate men were dying, were reached, yet the doors, hinges and fastenings had become so heated and swollen that they could not be opened. A portion, however, were opened, or nearly all would have met with the most terrible of deaths. There were twenty-four women in the cells. A fifth man was taken out in a senseless condition, but by wise treatment was restored.

We learn from the Boston Commonwealth, that a tragic affair occurred near Vackburgh, between Judge James and Mr Thomas Carneal, the former being fatally stabbed with a bowie knife. The son of Judge James then shot Carneal dead. Sheriff Yeager, and Roberts, a magistrate, were also wounded, whilst endeavouring to stop the affair. Young James surrendered to the authorities.

NOVASCOTIA.—The Halifax British American of Wednesday, says—One of the best concerted, most unanimous, and truly energetic meetings we have ever seen in the city, took place last evening at Dalhousie College, consisting of the Mechanics of the city—met to promote the Industrial Exhibition of 1853.

The hall was well filled with the bone and sinew, the muscle, eye! and we may add, the intelligence, of the community. The mechanics seemed to look forward with a keen eye to the Industrial Exhibition of 1853, though they are only just beginning to see what it means.

The Novascotian says—On Saturday the 20th, there were upwards of 12,000 bushels of potatoes entered at the Custom house in this city, from P. E. Island, besides a large quantity of other produce, comprising oats, barley, &c. Yesterday, 22d, there were of potatoes and oats, respectively entered 11,600 bushels, and 3,360 ditto. The Islanders are good customers of our merchants and traders, and of course it is a good omen when we see them with large surplus productions.

For the first time this season snow fell to lay on our streets, on Saturday last, to the depth of two or three inches. There has, however, been a good deal of snow experienced in the eastern part of the Province.

It is in contemplation, we learn, by parties here and in the United States, to provide extensive and economical accommodation for persons intending to proceed from this Province to the Industrial Fair at N. York.

MINING REGULATIONS.

1. Owners of Land may apply for a Lease of the Mining Rights reserved by the Crown in the Grants of Such Lands, and the same will then be offered at public Auction, after sixty days notice. The application to be accompanied by evidence of the title, and by a plan of survey of the Land made by a Deputy Surveyor.

2. The term of the Lease will be twenty five years, and will contain a clause of renewal, or that the Government may resume and take the improvements at a valuation, to be made by Arbitrators mutually chosen by the Surveyor General for the time being, and by the Lessee or his Assigns.

3. The upset preference price to be five pounds, and payment to be made within one hour after the time of sale. A fixed rent of one shilling per chaldron on coal, and five per cent. on the value of all other minerals raised, to be paid quarterly, on the first days of January, April, July and October, each year, to the Receiver General, or an Agent for that purpose to be appointed by the Government. The statement on which such payments are to be made, to be on oath.

4. That if the Lessee or his Assigns shall not actually raise coal or other mineral to the value of one hundred pounds, from his ground within any one year after the first, during the continuance of the Lease, the same shall become forfeited.
