

Shediac, and before the line to the United States, they would oppose the measure. They did not wish to irritate the Government, and therefore quietly made them aware of their determination, when they consented to introduce a clause curing that line as above.— Thus by the combined and unanimous action of the Northern members, your people have a fair prospect of a Railway communication with St. John, Nova Scotia, and the United States, and as a necessary consequence with Quebec, because their is little doubt but the Imperial Government will lend their aid to complete the great military road. Another good will arise out of this meeting, viz: the North will see that when united, their influence is not to be despised however strong a Government may think themselves. I believe the Government would have carried their Bills through the lower house though opposed by the Northern members, but they would have had a hard run up stairs. The House will rise to-morrow, and the Bills be sent home for the Royal assent at once, and we may hope to have the work begun in the spring. The Provincial Stock is confined to the original sum £250,000 sterling. All the other aid will be in loan, which together with the stock is not to exceed £3000 sterling per mile for the whole road, and for this the Company are to pay six per centum interest, secured by a mortgage on the whole line, rolling stock, stations, &c.; so that should the interest or principal not be paid, the Province will get a Railroad for £3000 per mile and on which cost £6500 per mile, should the company only build from the Bend or Shediac, to St. John, the law compels them to commence and build the line to Miramichi, and before St. John can be connected by rail with the United States, the Miramichi line will and must be built. There was a good deal of cross firing in a good natured way between the government and opposition. Gray congratulated Johnston upon his supporting the Government and reminded the House that Hannibal though sworn to hate the Romans was yet tempted by the luxuries and good things of Rome to forego his enmity. Johnson replied that he had not changed his opinion of the Government nor had he in this measure gone over to them, the smaller body had in this instance attracted the greater; and referred to the amendment to the Government Resolution of last year. Harding had moved and Johnson seconded an amendment to the effect that the Provincial Revenues should not be pledged to build any Railroad that would not connect the Eastern with the Western side of New Brunswick; this the Government had opposed and carried through their own absurd scheme. and when that scheme failed in Britain the Government had adopted the very line proposed by the opposition last winter they had come over to the opposition and as in Railroad travelling had mistaken their own motion for that of surrounding objects.

As to the description of Hannibal, the Hon. member was merely drawing his own picture he had been sent to oppose the Government but in one short winter had been seduced by the luxuries and pleasures of office, he was now in their ranks but if He (Mr J.) should ever be converted he would at least require more Cogent and Substantial Reasons than had been offered to or received by that Gentleman; He was himself the Hannibal he had described and differed from Hannibal of old only because one was Black and the other Gray.

A Bill to reduce the Head money on emigrants to 2s. 6d. has passed the Assembly, this is intended to facilitate the influx of labour for Railway and other purposes but 'tis doubtful whether it be not injudicious to diminish the fund thus raised and required for the support of sick and indigent emigrants. An address to the Queen on the fishery question has passed both branches thanking Her Majesty for the protection afforded during the past season and urging the importance of preserving these fisheries for Her own Subjects—on the whole the business has been well and quickly done, and of your members there is none who has exerted himself more or is more deserving of credit than another, they have worked together forgetting in the importance of the question all political differences and willing to forego even the pleasure of opposing or supporting the Government rather than endanger your railway prospects—you will no doubt see the Bills as introduced and be able to compare with those passed when your Representatives return, but in the meantime the foregoing may not be uninteresting to your readers.

SUNDAY'S MAIL.

UNITED STATES.

Another Great Indignation Meeting.—New Orleans, 12th.—It is estimated that the number present at the Cuban indignation meeting last evening reached 20,000, being the largest ever held. There were 200 Vice Presidents, and speeches of a powerful character were made from four different stands. Resolutions in favour of immediate redress were adopted and a copy ordered to be transmitted to the President of the United States.

The United States Expedition to Japan.—Arrangements for the Japan expedition are progressing in a favorable manner. It is now determined that the expedition shall consist of three superior war steamers, viz: the U. S. Steamer Mississippi, Captain Long, which will leave New York from the 1st to the 10th

November. The U. S. steamship Princeton, Commodore Perry, which will accompany the Mississippi as flag ship, and is now at Baltimore receiving her boilers. The third steamer is the Alleghany, which is now undergoing repairs at the Gosport Navy Yard, and will sail in January.

CANADA.

An old copper mine, of great richness, has been lately discovered on what is called the Hill vein, in the Lake Superior, County Queens. Who first opened this vein? There is much mystery connected with these ancient traces of mining operations, discovered from time to time in 'copper region,' so termed, of Canada West.

NOVA SCOTIA.

Telegraphic Improvement.—A new 'relay,' invented and patented by F. N. Gisborne, Esq., last month, has already come into favorable notice—25 instruments having been ordered for the Canada lines alone. The instrument works equally well either with a strong or slight current of electricity, is not liable to fixed magnetism, and requires no adjustment. This is an improvement indeed. Thanks of Mr Gisborne.

A letter from Pictou reports a tremendous gale at P. E. Island on the 15th instant—a great number of vessels wrecked; 12 vessels said to have sunk at their anchorage with all hands, at Souris. Also a gale at Sydney—a number of vessels ashore.

The Ellen Gisborne, steam yacht, to Mr F. N. Gisborne, arrived on Tuesday from Philadelphia via Holmes' Hole, and from the latter place in 42 hours.—Halifax Sun.
