NOVA SCOTIA.

Who's to blame.—A number of the Canada papers blame Mr Howe for not proceeding to England on the Railway mission. The Halifax British American introduces some remarks copied from a Quebec paper as follows:

"We cut the following from the Quebec Chronicle of the 19th instant. The Canada and New Brunswick people may be astonished at the apathy of the Honble. Joseph Howe; but if the feeling imputed to him be true, we are not astonished at it.

"If Messrs. Hincks and Chandler have not the support of Mr Howe, we believe they have nobody to blame so much as themselves. What did they do? After agreeing to the Toronto proposition, in favor of the Northern Line, they came here last winter and crossed the Legislature of Nova Scotia to agree to a line directly adverse to her interests. They violated their solemn pledges—and shrank from the fulfilment of their promises and duties. How could they expect the hearty support of any Nova Scotian in such schemes?"

Departure of the 42nd.—The gallant 42nd Highlanders embarked on Friday and Saturday last on board the Troop Ship Resistance, for Bonnie Scotland. At their last Parade on Friday, on playing the air 'Auld Lang Syne,' they were greeted with a volley of hearty cheers by our citizens. The 42nd depart from us with the highest eulogies of the press, and the universal regret of our citizens, at parting with them. We believe the Resistance sails this morning. Gentle gales and speedy passage to her gallant freight.

The steamer Pilot is to run from St. John to Annapolis every Monday, Wednesday, and Friday mornings, at 8 o'clock, and to leave Annapolis every Tuesday and Saturday morning at 7 o'clock, and Wednesday evening at tide time.

Off for the Diggins!—The Colonist says that a party left town on Monday for Annapolis to search for gold, in consequence of the extract from Blackwood that appeared in our columns that morning. It would as our cotemporary says, be curious if, after all, we had an El Dorado at our own doors.—We bespeak the first sample of the yellow dust. It may be sent to this office by letter. Come stir up there you young Annapolis fellows.—Halifax B. N. American, June 2.

The New York Courier and Enquirer, learns by special telegraph from Washington, that President Arista declares that Mexico will never consent to the opening of the Tehuantepec route by a foreign company. If the work is executed at all, says the Minister, it must be by the Mexican Government. In taking this position, Mexico contemplates the contingency of war, but relies upon the aid of the English Government to maintain her declarations.—Halifax Sun.

NEW BRUNSWICK.

Reed's Point Landings.—At a meeting of the Common Council, the plan submitted by Mr Thomas Coram of Carleton for the erection of the wharves at Reed's Point was approved of by the Board. The adoption of this plan, it is expected, will cause a considerable saving of expense.

Escape of Thomas F. Meagher.—This individual, whose reported escape from banishment was noticed a short time ago, arrived at New York on Thursday last, in the brig Acorn, from Pernambuco. He made his escape from Van Dieman's Land about the first of December, proceeded directly to the coast of South America, and arrived at Pernambuco in April. Mrs. Meagher was unable to accompany him in his flight. He says that when he escaped, his fellow prisoners, O'Brien and Mitchell, were in good health. He declines making public the means by which he made his escape, because he is unwilling to compromise others. On his arrival at New York, he was waited upon by an immense number of persons, both Americans and Irishmen. Among those who called were some of the most prominent of the whig and democratic politicians. In reference to a remark of some persons about Kossuth, Mr. Meagher said he was not opposed to Kossuth, for if he were he would be only injuring his own cause, which was identical with that of Hungary.—New Brunswick.

SOUTH AMERICA.

Late from Campeachy.—A courier arrived at Campeachy on the 6th, bringing news that a detachment of the army had penetrated the Indian country to the banks of the Rio Honda, where they captured an English schooner, laden with arms and munitions of war, intended for the Indians. Five or six Indian leaders were captured and shot, and the vessel burned.
