EUROPE.

DEPARTURE FOR AUSTRALIA.—The departures from the port of London for the Australian colonies during the past week skow considerable diminution, and have, with a few exceptions, comprised only vessels of a small class.

FRANCE.—The Moniteur of this day (Friday) amounces the levy of S9 000 recruits.

GERMANY.—Dispatches from Frankfort state that the Diet had admitted the claim of Austrian on the Germanic Confederation to the amount of 107,000,000 florins, for the expenses of the war in Italy and Hungary; on the ground that such wars had served to protect the frontiers of Germany. Inccuraged at the decision, Prussia now clams nineteen and a half million florins for expenses incurred in suppressing the insurrection in Posen.
