#### SUNDAY'S MAIL.

##### UNITED STATES.

TERRIFIC STORM IN NEW YORK.—A tremendous thunder and lightning and hail storm burst upon New York city last Friday afternoon. The Crystal Palace was flooded, the goods damaged, and the glass broken. A house in Forty-third street was blown down and three men killed and several others wounded. One person was killed by lightning in Fifty-first street. Four buildings at the corner of Second avenue and Thirty-fifth street were blown down, and one man was killed.

In Williamsburg L. I., the storm was awful; trees and unfinished houses were blown down; a hundred houses were unroofed, and almost every house in the place was damaged.

The steeple of the 1st Presbyterian Church was blown off, carrying with it a large portion of the roof, and falling across the street nearly demolished the dwelling house opposite.

The steeple of the Dutch reformed Church, in Fourth-street, was torn off. The bell on the roof of the lecture room, completely crushing it in. Loss about \$10,000.

About one-third of the roof of the Methodist Episcopal Church was also blown off.

Three rope-walks in the vicinity of Grand street and Bushwick avenue were completely destroyed, causing a loss of \$15,000.

At Beverley, N. J., the Episcopal Church was struck by lightning, and nearly demolished.

TERRIBLE DEATH.—Mr Winthrop Richardson, a retired tailor, and a man very well known in this city, met with a shocking death, on Saturday evening, near his residence in Stoneham. His daughter, Mrs Henry B. Wood, with her child, had been paying him a visit during the afternoon, and a quarter before 5 took her leave of him at the house—which is but a few paces from the depot—with a view of returning to Boston in the six o'clock accommodation stage. Mr Richardson started from his house a few minutes after, for the purpose as is supposed of seeing Mrs Wood safely in the cars. As he approached the track the Manchester Express train hove in sight. He looked at it, as it to measure the distance, and then attempted to run across the rails. He made several jumps, and succeeded in leaping upon the platform, but in doing so, lost his equilibrium, fell backwards, and was struck by the locomotive. His head was crushed into atoms—the warm brain was found upon the platform—the liver adhered to one of the brakes; the still throbbing heart was found upon a rail, and pieces of dismembered limbs strewn along the track for some distance. Not a limb escaped unbroken, and mangle was never more complete. The engine was smeared over with blood, and particles of flesh adhered to it. Mrs Wood was a spectator of the destruction of her father, and two or three other persons were standing near the station house at that time.—[Worcester (Mass) Aegis.]

The New York Senate have passed the Main Liquor Law, 17 to 13.

THE MAIN LAW IN MICHIGAN.—A telegraphic despatch from Detroit, Michigan says:—"Every county, city and village has gone for the Main Law. Majority at least 20,000."

Printers with nine children are to be exempted from taxation in the State of New York.

A suit was recently brought against the proprietor of the New York Scientific American for an alleged libel in an article speaking in unfavourable terms of self-raising flour. The jury rendered a verdict for six and a quarter cents.

BALTIMORE, June 28.—A terrible fire is raging at Fell's Point. Market destroyed, and the stores and dwellings on both sides. It is spreading westward, defying the efforts of the firemen. The fire broke out at Strauss's four story grocery warehouse on Broadway. The building was entirely gutted. The flames communicated to two stores below, and the hotel on the corner, which were consumed. The market house then took fire, and was completely destroyed. The flames next crossed the street, burning Strauss's other grocery store. Mrs. Randall's house, and it is feared will destroy the entire block on both sides of the street.

#### NEW BRUNSWICK.

RAILWAY INTELLIGENCE.—William A. Goodwin, Esq., C. E., the gentleman appointed to survey a line of railway between the Falls and the American lines, has, with his party, reached Musquash, where they are now encamped, in the rear of Mr. Garbutt's dwelling house. As yet, we learn that no very serious engineering difficulties have presented themselves. Mr. Morton, who is the consulting engineer of this line,

is expected here on Saturday next.—St. John New Brunswick.

The Harbour Grace Herald of the 22nd says: The fishery here up to this date has been poor. A similar account has reached us from the southward.

The Shore fishery had considerably improved a few days before the steamer left St Johns.
