

TELEGRAPH NEWS.

FREDERICTON, March 28.
At 1 o'clock, on motion of Mr Partelow, the House went into Supply, and passed several grants. Two for a Roman Catholic School in the city of St. John; one for £250 for the relief of indigent Indians; one for £500 for the purpose of sending home to Britain an agent to induce Emigrants to New-Brunswick; moved by Mr Kerr, was withdrawn by consent. The militia bill sent down from the Legislative Council, with a suspending clause, after some debate was adopted upon division of 15 to 13. £34 were granted for the Orphan of a widow murdered by a lunatic near Long Beach, in 1851, to enable them to purchase 200 acres of land. House adjourned.

Fredericton, March 29.

Several sums were entered in the supply book, for erection of wharves, pay of old soldiers, &c. Mr Partelow moved that a committee be appointed to report Petitions for, and against the repeal and suspension of the Liquor Law. He wished the question argued calmly, in committee, agreed to, and Messrs Partelow, Montgomery, Porter, Scoullar, Botsford, McPherson, and Ryan were nominated; four of those voted for the bill and three against it last year. Mr Gray presented a petition from Carleton, for amendment of charter of St John Presbyterian Church. Mr McPhelia moved his resolution that the house do not receive the contingent account, unless items, &c., are furnished. Mr Wilmot spoke of the expense of printing, but the resolution passed. Mr Hatheway moved the house into committee on the order of the day, to consider messages, and drew their attention to the pay of Colonel Haynes, as Adjutant General; the Governor's contingencies, &c. There was some discussion, but no resolution proposed, and the further consideration postponed until the Committee of Accounts reported. The House in supply, £3 were voted to buy a farm for a man settled on a back road, ten miles from the nearest settler. Mr Porter moved a grant in aid of a Lock-up house in St. Stephens—lost after a long discussion. Attorney General moved £1,000 in aid of the erection of a bridge on the North West Miramichi, progress reported, as the Executive Council met. Mr Smith moved to enter a grant for a Lock-up-house at Shediac, which after a long discussion, was lost. Reconsideration was moved—a discussion over three hours, when it was again lost. Several bills were sent down from council agreed too, viz., the fire Police Bill of St. John; dog tax bill; bills to amend the charter of St John Gas Company; St. John Hotel Company; and St. John cemetery. A bill to incorporate the Courtenay Bay Bridge Company with amendments. A bill to erect Parish of St. Marks. The Diocesan Church Society bill, and others. Also the bill to amend the School act introduced in council. The Election bill is fixed as order of the day for Monday. Mr Harding brought in a bill to authorise the Catholic Episcopal Corporation to sell certain Lands, &c. The committee of accounts had not reported.

Fredericton, March 30.

Several petitions presented against the repeal of the Liquor Law. Several sums entered on the supply book. Mr Hatheway's bill regulating the driving of logs in small steamers in York, passed. Mr Gray brought in a bill further to amend the Law. A bill relating to foreign Insurance Companies, doing business by Agents. Mr Kerr's bill to place several roads on the great road establishment, was lost in committee. House in committee on the bill for registration of marriages, &c.; after a discussion of several hours, a motion to postpone for three months, was lost, 15 to 19. Progress reported. Mr English for a writ for the election of a member for Carleton, in the room of Mr Beardsley, deceased. Bill relating to St. Stephen's Church property, and bill relating to the public debt of St. John, passed the council; also the Bill for the division of King's Ward, with an amendment, making the first election for the new Ward, to take place first Tuesday in May. Mr Kerr, to provide for settlement of Paupers, was committed, read, and progress reported.

Fredericton, March 31.

The Bill to empower the Catholic Corporation to sell certain lands passed in committee; House in supply, £100 voted towards the erection of a Seaman's Hospital in Bathurst, several sums recommended by the Emigrant Committee, among others £50 to Mr McAvity, led to a long discussion, during which the conduct of the Emigrant Agent, was spoken of. Mr Johnson charged him with neglect of his duties. Messrs. Wilmot and Gray defended him; denounced the penny papers. Mr Wilmot said Mr Partelow served the interests of the Province in the Fisheries; said the statements in the Freeman and Morning News about public officers, were nice out of tone, base, infamous lies. Mr Partelow

drew attention to statements relative to Bowes, put down as assets. There was a note in this statement, showing it had been collected, and placed in hands of the late Attorney General. This was omitted, on the report in the Freeman. He excused the Freeman of garbling reports for political purposes. £700 were granted to aid the erection of a toll bridge over the North West branch of Miramichi. On motion of Mr Partelow, the Bill to renew bear and wolves bounty Act was postponed for 3 months. The Bill to confirm the conveyance of the estate of a Lunatic at St. John; the Bill to protect the navigation of the St. Croix; the Bill to incorporate certain bodies in connection with the Wesleyan Church were sent down from Council, with amendments. Mr Crane, the late Speaker is reported to be dying.

St. John, April 1.

Niagara from Liverpool, 19th March, arrived at Halifax at 5 p. m., on Wednesday evening. Full freight and passengers, fair weather; in fog, struck entrance of harbour. Arctic arrived at midnight on the 15th.

Britain.—Parliamentary business very important. Lord John Russell stated that Government had consented to reduce the duty on printed calicoes and paper, and bills referring thereto, would soon be submitted. Mr Mills drew the attention of the Government to wester route of British troops to Canada, through territory of the United States, and asked if Government intended to facilitate by guarantee or otherwise, the completion of Halifax and Quebec railroads. Mr Paul for government, was unable to state. Lord John Russell spoke of Austrian proceedings towards Sardinia, in consequence of Milan insurrection. Sardinian Government had refused. British Government had refused to interfere against sequestration. Britain had written strong letters to Vienna, but in mean time Austrian authorities stated intention to remove sequestration from Piza, proving themselves innocent. That Government had received notice that the Grand Duke had liberated the Medici family, and allowed them to leave Tuscany. Canada Reserve Bill slowly proceeds through Committee—third reading Jew Bill adjourned to April 11. Petitions against Maynooth grant pour in Bishop of Quebec and Archdeacon York, Canada, petitioned against interference with Reserves. Estimated imports of gold during next three weeks about £2,000,000 sterling. Mail steamer Australia, after four attempts, has given up the journey to Australia.

British ship Burnice was burned by mutineers, Javanees Marilla men, Captain and officers murdered in Straits of Gasburg.

Emperor's policy at present moment being to preserve quiet aspect towards all governments, until after coronation. Political news scarce. Great anxiety manifested for Pope's visit to Paris—likely, but not certain, will come. On dit, that Emperor of Austria insists on Pope coming to Vienna to crown, but to this Napoleon will not assent, it is very doubtful too if Napoleon concede anything in spiritual affairs to Pope, if he does come. Gen. Canobert has been offered St. Arnaud's Portfolio but declines unless Changartier dies. An entertainment is to be given on April 2nd, by city of Paris to Emperor and Empress. Morilla the eminent Chemist, is dead, aged 70 years.

The pension heretofore paid by Government to Polish refugees are withdrawn, no cause assigned.

PORTUGAL.—News more important than usual. Lisbon 12th, Fints Minister of Finance, laid before Deputies, Bill authorizing Government Monopoly of Tobacco and Soap, and allow Tobacco growing at Maderia.

BELGIUM.—Chamber voted annual income, 200,000 Francs, to Duke de Brabant, heir presumptive, King's eldest son, aged 18 years, also to Royal Residences, export duties on several articles reduced.

GERMANY.—Diet decided to enroll only 50,000 instead of 200,000 Troops.

Paris Moniteur publishes Convention between France and Wirtemberg, for mutual extradition of criminals.

DENMARK.—Diet opened on the 7th.

SWITZERLAND.—Old Switzer Spirit seems roused against Austria, from Berne is reported that Austria without occupying Ticino will maintain the blockade indefinitely, but no answer given yet, to the Federal Council.

Private accounts tell sad stories of sufferings of banished Tyrolese, women, and children, perishing by the way.

AUSTRIA.—Emperor completely recovered, physicians recommend him to travel in Tyrol, the Church ceremony in honour of his escape, passed off quietly.

128 supporters of Government dissatisfied with recent statements in British Parliament. Would not expell Refugees.—Austria thinks would be no use to prosecute Mazzini or Kossuth in English Courts, no Jury would find them guilty. Hayaan is dead, no particulars given.

The firm of Mechanest, Old Vienna, has failed for 200,000 florins.

The weather is still in a very unsettled state.

The militia are employed in strengthening the fortifications and gates.

The value of confiscated properties in Lombardy is stated to be £5,000,000 sterling.

Tuscany.—The conclusion of a treaty of commerce between France and Tuscany, is announced.

Turkey.—The Turks have evacuated Montenegro. The Russian envoy had a conference with the Sultan on the subject. The Russian ultimatum is repelled by the Divan. The Sultan invokes assistance from France and England. The British fleet is ordered from Malta, to the Archipelago.

St. Petersburg.—Letters of 2nd state, that immense embezzlements had been discovered in the Army and Naval administrations. The Adjutant General and other officers under trial.

Cape of Good Hope.—Dates are to the 6th February. Arrangements were making by the governor, for a declaration of peace. A commission had been appointed at Grahamstown, to investigate claims for losses sustained in the war. Guerilla bands of Kaffers still invest the settlements.

Liverpool Markets.—Cotton market rather dull, first of the week, but partially recovered, an advance of 1-16 to 1-18 established. Sales of the week 53,340 bales: Spinners had run out of stock. Corn market—a better tone prevailed during the week, and markets closed heavily. Wheat 1d. Corn 6d. and Flour 3d. to 6d. higher.

London.—An active demand for sugars and more enquiry for coffee and tea. Coffee firmer. Iron £8 10 for bars; £9 for rails. Scotch pig closed firm at 54s. 6d. cash, in the Clyde. Money in good demand—consols closed at 99 3/4 for money. Large arrivals of Australia gold. In Manchester a slightly better feeling has prevailed, without however, leading to much business.

No report to-day.—House adjourned till Monday, on account of the death of the late Speaker.
