

to fall within the great Union, as the ripened fruit is to fall in the season. This is "manifest destiny."

Having annexed the whole of North and South America, with our "manifest destiny" be fulfilled? Certainly not. Japan and China are separated from us only by a strip of water, and belong naturally to these United States. They must come into the American Union. On the other hand, our relations with Great Britain and other European nations are so intimate that it may soon become necessary to extend over them one wing of the American Eagle. Africa and other parts of Asia will follow as a matter of course. In the opinion of these agitators, it is our destiny to absorb "all creation," and every person knows it is useless and absurd to resist destiny.

EUROPEAN NEWS.

The Royal mail steamer arrived at Halifax at 7 o'clock on Monday evening, after a fine run of a little over nine days. Our files are to the 28th May. We have made some selections from them, to which we refer our readers for the latest European News.

THE LIQUOR LAW.

It will be seen by the proceedings of a Public Meeting recently held in Kent County, the particulars of which will be found in another column, that the friends of temperance are determined that as far as they are concerned, the present law for the prevention of the traffic in spirituous liquors, will not become a dead letter. In this place, as far as we are able to collect any information and our observation extends, there is no difference—the traffic is still pursued, and no effect being made to carry out its provisions by the public authorities, or by any other body.

NEWFOUNDLAND.

The Assembly and present administrator of the Government, it appears, are loggerheads. Mr Hamilton sent down to the house an extraordinary message, intimating his desire that they would proceed to vote the supplies. This was considered an infringement on their privileges, and the members resolved themselves into a Committee of the whole on Privileges. After a considerable debate, several Resolutions were passed, and we subjoin the first and last, which were unanimously adopted:

Resolved—That the said message is a manifest breach of the privilege of this House, and however anxious this House are to maintain a good understanding with His Excellency, this House cannot, with due regard to their rights and privileges, which it is their sacred duty to uphold intact, permit this document to be recorded on their Journals unaccompanied with the unequivocal expression of their opinion thereon.

Resolved—That this House are most anxious to uphold the credit of this colony, and would deeply regret any step that would impair it, but looking to the present state of the country, the amount of the public debt, and the demands on the public revenue, they feel persuaded that nothing tends more to the destruction of that credit than the present system of government, which is devoid of public confidence.

TO TRAVELLERS.

The Eastern Chronicle furnishes us with the following piece of news respecting the opening up of a steam communication, between Shediac, Charlottetown, and Pictou:

Mr Whitney's steamer Fairy Queen, as will be seen by advertisement in another column, is now established on the route between Pictou, Charlottetown, Shediac, and Shediac, having received the contract from the Government of P. E. Island for carrying the mails between the above places. This route is now the cheapest for travellers from the eastern part of Nova Scotia to the United States; in addition to this, it also presents great attractions to the summer tourist, from the variety of scenes presented. Leaving Pictou on Saturday morning, the steamer will arrive at Charlottetown at mid-day, and as she remains there until Monday forenoon an opportunity is afforded for seeing the town, (and we do not know a spot where a summer day can be spent more pleasantly,) and for viewing the beautiful scenery in the vicinity. On Monday forenoon the steamer leaves Charlottetown for Shediac, touching at Shediac. On arriving at Shediac, there are good conveyances in waiting to carry passengers, at about 2s 6d each, across the country to the Bay, a distance of some fifteen miles, where they can go on board either the Commodore or the Oreola, the former leaving that place twice and the latter once a week for St. John. From St. John the splendid steamers Admiral and Eastern City run twice a week to Boston, touching at Esport and Portland. The Fairy Queen has very comfortable accommodation for passengers, and with her reasonable charges and attentive officers, we doubt not she will be liberally patronized.
