FARMING.

"Now, that's some of your book farm-ing. I don't believe it," says one. "Your "answere" and "inquiries" your "recipes" and " notices;" its all a humbug. Here I have farmed for twenty years, and I raise almost as good crops as when I first begun and no thanks to our Agricultural Meet-ings and Horticultural Societies. I live where my father lived, and farm as he taught me.

How many there are of this class, who pled the same rack their fathers did, without a single variation. How many there are, I say, who use the same old fashoned time-condemned plough ; the same old harrow ; the same skin-breaking hay-rakes in short the same utensils their fathers used, while all around them are making articles that will do the labor in half of the time, and with less expense. They say, "my father did so, and 1'll do it." That, is no argument. None but the most ignorant can command prass enough to take this position.

Youmost recollect that this is an eventful period. A revolution is now taking place in society. Mind is getting the ascendancy, and, in order to keep up with the "times" you must work " head-work." You must work in accordance with the rules of Nature, in order to get the greatest profit from your soil. You must know the nature of the soil, and understand You must what manures are wanting.

You must understand the peculiarities of the different sorts of grain, and what kind of soil is best adapted to their growth. You should know the habits of those insects that are so destructive to vegetation, in order to know the proper time for plough ing and planting, to secure the crop from their ravages, or to ensure their eradicati-on. You should know the best machines and their mode of operation ; the best plan for out-buildings, and numerous things re-quisite to make a good farmer. What better way can this be accomplished than by farmers uniting and giving their experierce the result of their experiments in your periodical.

We can learn something from every one. The old adage goes so far as to say. "Two heads are better than one, if one is a sheep's head," although I have never seen a practical illustration of this maxim in full, yet it is an indispensable fact that uni-ty is a requiste quality of success. But who are they who disapprove of these measures and say, "fish on your own hook and I will mine?" Are they not the ignorant, whose narrow views are confined by prejudice to one continued circle ? Are they not foes to science, and clogs in the wheels of agriculture ? but they are to be pitied rather than censured.

Farmers, we are bound to preserve the best system of agriculture and improve upon it, as imperiously as we are bound to preserve the peace and prosperity of so-ciety. It is our duty to improve onr lands, a duty we owe to curselves, to our families, and to the community in which


