A schooder hired by Sir George Seymour has been manned and armed for the purpose of guarding the entrance of the Bay of Chaleur, between Point Miscou (the extreme north-eastern part of the Province) and Point Mackerel, on the Gaspe shore, in order to prevent all invusion on the waters of that Bay.—The steamer Rose formerly mail-packet between Charlottetown and Pictou, has also been hired and armed, to-cruise on the north side of Prince Edward Island, and prevent trespasses there.

On Monday, a meeting was held, when they resolved to pay all damages, and endeayour to ferret out the villains who participated in the riots recently.
