THE FRUIT CROP AND ITS ENE MIES.

The crop of plums, cherries and aprieots, has been almost ruined by the curculio, and even the peach has not escaped its ravages. That part which was not blasted by the leaf 'curl' has shared the fate of the plums and cherries.

Another formidable depredator has made nearly a clean sweep of the apple crop—not the tenth part will be realized in this section. The insect is a small brown leaf roller. They commence operations usually in the bud, and as soon as the leaf expands, draw its edges together by means of silken threads and form for themselves a secure retreat. Their presence is indicated by the death of such leaves as they attack. As they increase in size and the clusters of fruit and young shoots begin to form they eat them off at the base, thus destroying the fruit, and injuring the growth of the tree. Their main field of operations seems to be in the apple tree, although the pear, plum and cherry are not exempt.

There is no well defined cause for the curl of the peach leaf. In my garden and nur-sery, the Crawford's Early, Early York, Coolidge's Favourite, Jacques' Rareripe, Morris White, and Early Tillotson, have been almost entirely free from it, while the Large Early York, Crawford's Late Old Mixon Free Haine's Early, Bergen's Yellow, Snow and several seedling trees, are the greatest ease, and with renewed health nearly ruined. The pear erop is more promising than another kind of fruit, and, if no new enemy takes the field, it will be full an average one.

The use of peach stocks for the apricot ought to be abandoned. The trees are snort lived and do not hold their fruit nearly as well as when worked on the plum or hardshelled almond. The latter, budded at standard height, makes one of the very best stocks for either peach or apricot.
