Gloucerter County Agricultural Society.

THE Society's Annual meeting was held in the Court House, Bathurst, on the second Tuesday in February, previous to which, and on the same day, the Exhibition of GRAINS, DAIRY PRODUCE, ROOTS, and DOMESTIC MANU-

The Show created a good deal of interest throughout the day: the rooms were visited by a large number of the inhabitants, and every article carefully inspected. The number of members present was equal to that on many former occasion, and all took an exciting interest in the competition and subsequent proceedings. The variety and quality of the Grains exhibited indicated no falling off, and the whole evidenced a steady improvement in the industry of the

County.

The Wheat averaged in weight 63 lb., there being twelve specimens exhibited. The Barley averaged 54 lbs., seven specimens exhibited; and twelve specimens of White Oats,

specimens exhibited; and twelve specimens of White Oats, and ten of Black Oats, were shown, the first averaging 47 lbs., and the last 40 lbs. per bushel.

REPORT.

Your Committee have pleasure in reporting that the Society has passed another year—exhibiting signs of increasing usefulness, and much of that interest which marked its operations in former years, and evincing in its general retion so fondly anticipated; bringing out prominently and rules of the Society, to Members residing in different parts clearly; the effects of the influence of the Society, on the ge- of the County. netal presperity of the County, and on the people where its influence extends.

The past year not only possesses elements of congratulation on account of new support and increasing good, but adds another year's satisfactory experience to the order through which the principles and workings of the society has passed, notwithstanding the many doubts and discountied lots, at cost and charges, and has turned out well. In

along Salmon Beach, however, both the straw and grain were greatly injured by rust and the wevel, the yield being The cultivation of this important cereal, in the latter districts, is being gradually abandoned, and that of White Oats at d Barley, substituted.

BARLEY has fully sustained its former reputation throughout the whole of the County, and is now considered a safe and profitable crop, the returns received, show an average of thirty-six bushels an acre, a decided improvement on for-mer years. The Chevalier is the favourite.

In the middle and lower districts the Oar crop has been

in general, luxuriant; the straw in some places, heavy, and the grain in all places, well filled. Above, in Belledoune, and where the soil is light, the returns were not so favourable with Points of the soil is light, the returns were not so favourable. able: the Potato Oat is most approved, and is largely pro-

pagated everywhere. HAY throughout nearly the whole of the County, was light, owing to the drought in the early part of the season. It was for a time feared that it would be scarce and dear; there now appears, however, to be sufficient for the increased stock in the County. The Rye Grass tried for two years has proved a failure.

TURNIPS in nearly all cases, when properly cultivated, has turned out an abundant crop, and in many instances with the most caseless culture, a heavy yield has been obtained. There was a considerable breadth of land sown down last

The raising of Indian Corn as a regular crop-at one time much cultivated in the County—is nearly abandoned; the climate is not to be depended on for bringing it to matu-

It is in the return of the Poratos crop, that the greatest relative difference is discovered. In the upper part of the County this crop did not amount to an average one; while in Bathurst and in the settlements around it, and on the farms along the eastern shores, the general yield greatly surpassed in quantity, that of former seasons. The stock now on hand exceeds that for many years back, at the same period. Many lots were injured by the rot, to the extent of one half the quantity, and upwards, the greater portion, only to a very limited degree, and some fields escaped altogether untouched. A fair estimate of the loss on the crop, throughout the County, would not exceed an average of filteen per cent. Experience has now taught the grower, that it is no preservative to the root to lift the potatoe immediately after the disease strikes the stalk. disease strikes the stalk.

The introduction of the Horn CATTLE and the Hogs, in 1850 and 1851 by the society, has had a marked and benefi-cial effect in improving the breed of these animals, more particularly the Hogs. Judicious management of this and former Committees, has spread this benefit around that part the influence of the Society. In the feeding of Pigs we can now stand in favorable comparison with any County in the Province. The Committee regret to have to report, that much injury has been done, and the propagation of the breed impeded, in consequence of the infringement of one of the Society's most important rules, by the purchaser of the Boar imported from Scotland. They have visited with such punishment in their power, the parties implicated, and now recommend that steps be taken to obtain from the Provincial Legislature an Act of Incorporation, to enable the Society to prosecute all such infringements in future,

The Committee following up the views and principles of their predecessors, decided on importing from Great Britain, some Sheep of a superior description, to cross with their present excellent breed. Two Liecester and two Cheviot Rams, of a pure breed were accordingly ordered, and at the request of the Committee, selected by Thomas Ballantine, Esq. of Carlille, England, (whose gratuitous attention in this matter, they have pleasure in acknowledging.) The whole were forwarded to this Province, via Liverpool, where they arrived in good order, and were cold. arrived in good order, and were sold, under the restrictive

The Committee also imported from Britain, a number of Grain Riddles, in setts, of a description much used on

The last year—that to which the present Report has more particular reference—shews it will subsequently be observed, an increased number of subscribers, and an increased amount of expenditure, for legitimate and useful purposes; and when the whole business is summed up, and the general progress of the Society considered, the Committee will claim for themselves, as the parties intrusted with the management of the institution, the approval of the meeting.

In collecting the necessary returns, to enable them to take a brief review of the results of the last year's crops, as compared with former years, your Committee have observed that no previous year, have they been so variously stated in the respective districts of the County as in this one.

In Belledoune, in the upper part of the Parish of Beresford, and in the Patish of New Bandon, the Wheat crop was fully egual to that of any former year, yielding on the average, fully eighteen bushels an acre of grain, of a very superior quality. In the interior of Bathurst Parish, and along Salmon Beach, however, both the straw and grain were greatly injured by rust and the weyel, the vield height.

The statement of account as appended hereto was made up and balanced on the 1st January, and agreeably to the requirements of the Laws, a copy of them transmitted to the office of the Provincial Secretary. The Society's financial year, however, does not terminate until after the second Tuesday of February, at which period a Report of the business of the past year is made out; and thereafter the Treasurer's account finally closed, copies of these documents also, will have to be forwarded to the Provincial Secretary; and, before making application for another year's Proviccial Grant, the previsions of the Act, passed last.
