proceedings would not be legal, and wou'd subject them to have their acts disputed by any inhabitant of the Parish who may feel

disposed to resist their authority. The only legitimate course now open for them to pursue is—to Petition the Legislature at the approaching Session, requesting them to pass a special Act, confurning their appointments, with full pow-er to act until the meeting of the Sessions in January. This would bring the matter up before that body, and shew them the ne-cessity there exis: for making some altera-tion in the present absurd Municipal Law,

Since the above has been put in type we have been furnished with a copy of a Bill, which is to be introduced, into the Legisla-ture, praying for the object stated above. We think the Rate Payers have acted wisely in coming to this decision.

It is truly refreshing to witness the spirit manifested in Newcastle Parish, to maintain their just rights and privileges. ALD

THE FISHERIES.

The following important Letter from M. EVERETT, the American Secretary of State, was submitted to Congress on 7th instant. It deserves a careful perusal. We think the time has arrived when the Legislatures of the different North American Colonies should take a determined stand on this all important subject. To the President of the United Sintes :-

The Secretary of State has the honor to aubmit to the President the following report in relation to the negociation pending between this government and that of Great Britain on the subject of the fisheries, of reciprocal in tercourse with the British American Provia-ces, and the navigation of the St Lawrence and the Canals connected with it. The pros-pects of the negotiation at the commencement of the session were alluded to in a general way in the President's Message. The atten-

way in the President's Message. The atten-tion of this Bepartment was given to the sub-ject at the earliest day possible, and it has been pursued with diligence. It has been perceived, with great satisfac-tion, that the government of Her Britannic Majesty is prepared to enter into an arrange-ment for the admission of the fishing vessels of the United States to a full participation in the nublic fisheries on the cost and house of the public fisheries on the coast and shores of the Provinces, with the exception at present of Newtoundland, and in the right of drying and curing the fish on shore, or condition of the admission, duty free, into the non-kets of the United States, of the Colorial fanceres on the same conditions that are reciprocally en-joyed by British, subjects on the consts and

shores of the United States. It is understood that the British gvernment is desirous in concert with the Provinces, to come to an agreement with the United States for reciprocal tree trade with the Pre-vinces, in cortain natural productions, and was not very clear, and the error into which that the free navigation of the river St. Law rence and that of the Welland Canals would be conceded as part of the arrangement. An agreement of this kind has fast several years received the attention of Congress, and a bill providing for reciprocal free trade in certain articles on one occasion, passed certain alticles on one occasion, passed the House of Representatives. The present negociations have been concluded by the De partment, undsr the impression that if the details of the atrangement could be satisfac-torily settled, and the such a way as to af-ford mutual benefit. Congress would be dis-pared to perform this part to carts in the sciford mittail benefit congress would be dis-posed to perform its part to carry it into ef-fect, even if the United States, the party which furnishes by far the largest market to the other, should think it necessary in some respect to limit and in others to enlarge the number of articles subject to the ar the number of articles subject to the ar-rangement, beyond what the Britlsh govern-ment or the Provinces would prefer. The Secretary of State has been of opinion that the main provisions above alluded to pro-mises so much benefit on both sides that it would be jelt to be expedient to enter into the arrangement for a definite time, leaving to future logislation and negogiation guided to future legislation and negociation, guided by experience, to render it still more satisfactory by limitation or enlargement.

The number and variety of the details which have presented themselves in the pro-gress of the negociations, and the important
