HOUSEWIVES ATTEND.

The following paragraph clipped from a late number of the Baltimore Sun, is well worthy the serious attention of housekeepers. The article spoken of is largely on the increase among us for domestic purposes.

On Sunday last the 4th inst., New Carlisle and its vicinity was visited by a dreadful Hail Storm which commenced about 2 p. m. It blew heavily from the North, and the windows of almost every house suffered more or less—several hundred panes of glass are said to have been broken—my own house bears ample evidence of the size of the hail stones, many of which I am credibly informed exceeded two inches.
