CURE FOR RHEUMATISM.

Rheumatism is a disease of the blood, and in order to effectually remove the disease the rheumatic poison, (perhaps the urate of sods) must be elimated from the circulation. The principally depurating organs are the emunctories of kidneys, the lungs and the skin. Through the skin and kidneys alone can the rheumatic poison be re-moved and far more through the latter than the for mer. every man afflicted with rheumatism should have a long bath tub, in which he can completely immerse his whole body. In such a tub (made of tin perhaps) he should every morning take a warm weak, ley bath, rubbing the surface briskly with a flesh brush till it glows finely. This bath should be used for four or five days, and then for a few days a strong salt water bath (warm) should be substituted. This is the best external treatment known to the profession, and the great trouble is that it is so little known to them. Warm flannel should of course, be constantly worn by rheumatics. But the great remedy for rheumatism, after all, is druretics; and among the best of them is the meadow saffron (colchicum autumale). The tincture of the colchicum seeds is generally used. The brandy tincture is the best for decidedly nervous rheumatics; the wine tincture for those of a firm nerve fibre. Of either of these tinctures, 25 drops, three times a day, for an adult, till it operates as a slight laxative (when the dose should be lessened) is about the right quantity After using the tincture of colchicum for ten or twelve days, the solution of iodine of potassi im (of the strength of one ounce to the pint of rain water,) half a teaspoonful twice a day will speedily complete the cure. An experience of several years in the treatment of all grades of rheumatism has established the correctness of the above treatment. I have never seen a case that would not yield to its power. Sometimes acids or (alkalies accordin gas the urinary deposit is while or red,) may be used with fine effect. The best acid that can be used in rheumatism is the citric, and the best form is that of sour lemonade, not lemonade made of lemon syrup, for that contains the child was restored to perfect health.

#### PRESERVING HERBS.

By attending to the following directions, all country people can have good herbs; and if they wish to give a city friend some acceptable trifle in return for their dinner when they go into the city shopping, let them roll up and carry a good bundle of various kinds of herbs, for in the city even a very small package costs sixpence, and a

All kinds of herbs should be picked as soon as they begin to blossom, the dust rinsed off, the leaves and flowers stripped from the stems and already on tins or clean paper and exposed to a moderate artificial heat till perfectly dry and crisp, then put away in a clean dry place. # FEEDING STOCK.

Always be regular and systematic in feeding your stock. Regularity is the best balance wheel of Agricultural enterprise; de-Regularity is the best barange this, and the machine "runs down." Stated hours and specified quantities -graduated according to circumstances, should invariably be observed. "Neither too little nor too much—too often nor too seldom," is, the true policy. The coarest fodder should be ted in mid-winter. Animals have then sharp appetites, and will eat what would be rejected at other times. In moderate wea-ther, stock may be fed in yards.

Why does water melt salt? Because very minute particles of water insinuate themselves into the pores of the salt, by capillary attraction, and force the crystals apart from each other.

Why is there always a draft through key holes and windew crevices? Because the external air, being colder than the air of the room we occupy, rushes through the window crevices to supply the deficiency caused by the escape of warm air up the chimney, &c.
