CHATHAM LOCK-UP-HOUSE BILL. PASSED AT THE LAST MEETING OF THE

CHATHAM LOCK-UP-HOUSE BILL.
PASSED AT THE LAST MEETING OF THE LEGISLATURE.
A Bill in addition to, and in amendment of an Act to authorize the Justices of the Peace for the County of Northumberland, to erect a Lock-up-House in the town of Chathers.
Be it enacted, by the Lieutenant Governor, Legis ative Council, and Assembly, as follows:
The first section of the Act in the title hereof recited be, and the same is hereby repealed, and in lieu of such section. The Justices of the Peace for the said County, or the major part of them present, at any General Sessions of the Peace hereby authorized and required by themselves, or by persons to be by them appointed to erect, or cause to be erected a Lock up House in the said Town of Chatham, on a piece ground to be purchased or appropriatel; and first purpose to be called, may, and descessment for a sum not exceeding two not fortham and called in such proportions, and in such manore and effect and first portuges of the Peace or the major part of them appointed to erect, or cause to be setted a Lock up House in the said Town of Chatham, on a piece ground to be purchased or appropriated; and the same develop authorized and required to make a rate and assessment for a sum not exceeding two not fortham gain and first ponda, to defray the expense of purchasing said Lead, and erecting and first hereby authorized and erecting and first hereby authorized in such proportions, and in such manore on the inhabitants and section of the front lots, bottween the lower side of Clarko's fort, and the up erside of S.
