PRESENT TO MRS. WEBSTER.—The New York Express says that some of Mrs. Webster's friends in that city, wishing to testify their respect for Mr Webster's memory, and their regard for Mrs. Webster who is a New York lady, have subscribed the sum of twenty-five thousand dollars as a present. They have tendered their liberal offering in the form of an elegant residence, handsomely furnished, or as an investment, subject to her control, and for her sole benefit.

H. M. SHIP LEANDER.—It is now announced that the Leander will not return again to New York. The N. Y. evening post says:—

We regret to learn that it has been determined that H. B. M. frigate Leander shall not return to this port after her departure next week for Halifax. One of the principal reasons for this change of purpose is the frequent desertion of her men, twenty-five of whom have already escaped; and the lack of undisputed power to reclaim them in this port. Two were seen from the deck of the frigate on board an American vessel the other day, on which they had shipped for a foreign port. The officers did not wish to compromise the peaceful and friendly object of the mission by sending for them, and to protect themselves from further losses, it has been deemed the least troublesome course to leave the port.

We also regret to learn that the sergeant-major was missing from the frigate yesterday, under circumstances which have awakened some anxiety for his safety.

A large party of the officers left the city last evening for Niagara Falls.

The American Naval Officers at New York visited the British frigate Leander off the Battery on Saturday morning, and were received by Capt. King and the other officers. They afterwards visited Lord Ellesmere and family in his cabin.

Lord Ellesmere returned to N. Y. from Philadelphia on Thursday night, and went to his cabin on board the Leander, which he preferred to the crowded hotel. He was to leave for Niagara in a day or two.

The British Commissioners of the World's Fair are visiting about the country collecting information with regard to its agricultural and manufacturing resources.

FREDERICTON MAIL.

The Honble. John Ross, Mr C. P. Ronney, and a number of engineers in addition to those who are already here connected with the Grand Trunk Railroad, arrived last night from England, via Champlain and St. Lawrence Railroad.—*Montreal Pilot.*

We observe, by the Toronto Mirror, that Dr. Charbonnel, the Roman Catholic Bishop of that diocese, has addressed a "circular" to his clergy, in consequence of "the deplorable events of Quebec and Montreal." His Lordship, in this circular, quotes largely from the New Testament, inculcating peace, meekness, and forbearance under provocation, and concludes with the following well-timed announcement:—

Were any Catholic of our Diocese to forget those principles of true Christianity, and cause any disturbance on the occasion of the 12th of July, he shall be deprived of receiving the Holy Communion for a length of time according to the degree of the scandal; and if he dies a victim of his disobedience to this present ordinance, his corps shall be deprived of the Ecclesiastical burial.—*Montreal Herald.*

A subscription amounting already to upwards of £1000, has been raised for the widow and children of the late Peter Gillespie, shot by the troops on the evening of the 9th instant; and another subscription list is going round for the widow and family of Mr Hutchison, who was similarly slain.—*Montreal Witness.*

It is reported that the Grimross Neck Canal at Gagetown, is to be proceeded with at once.

The price of square and round timber is still improving at St. John.

It is a strange and humiliating fact that not one of the six Government Directors was competent to sit in the meeting of the stockholders of the E. and N. A. Railway Company!

The Executive Council have appointed six of their own number, the Hon. Messrs. Chandler, Hazen, Montgomery, Wilnot, Gray, and Hayward, to the Directory of the European and North American Railway Company. It will be observed that neither the Provincial Secretary nor the Attorney General are of the number, and we must think their absence judicious. We think the event will show that this self nomination is not over-wise.—*Head Quarters.*

SUNDAY'S MAIL.

EUROPE.

The Trial screw steamer ship Lady Elginton arrived at Quebec, early yesterday morning, bringing one day's later news than the Baltic.

FRANCE.—It is stated that orders have been received by the maritime board of Paris, to make a levy of all mariners in that port that are able and fit for service—not even the married men are exempted from the effects of this measure. Alarming rumors have kept the exchange in a state of fluctuation all day. Those rumors, however, have not been confirmed. Nevertheless the funds have fallen.

AUSTRIA.—The King of Bavaria has arrived at Vienna. It is asserted that the Russian Ambassadors at Vienna and Berlin insist on Austria and Prussia discontinuing that passive part they have, up to the present, played in the Oriental question.

A later despatch from Vienna says that the Emperor fully approves of Menschikoff's proceedings at Constantinople.

MONTENEGRO.—It is stated that on his return to Montenegro, Prince Daniel distributed 200 medals, with the Russian arms, among the troops, and that he had assured them that they would soon have an occasion to prove their valor, not in defence of their own land, but for the purpose of reconquering from the Turks territories of which the latter have deprived them.

NOVA SCOTIA.

LAYING THE CORNER STONE OF THE MARKET.—This interesting ceremony took place yesterday. Unfortunately the weather was unpropitious, alternate sunshine and slight showers rendering somewhat unpleasant an otherwise most delightful day. The old exchange building fronting the site of the Market House was tastefully ornamented with flags, while around and within, notwithstanding the rain, were congregated a numerous assemblage, comprising thousands of both sexes, all eager to obtain positions commanding a view of the edifice in course of erection, and the ceremonies to be performed; fronting which were placed a guard of honor from the 72d Highlanders. At twelve o'clock the members of the City Council and the various Masonic Lodges, headed by the splendid Band of the 72d, left the Masonic Hall and marched in procession to Government House, where they were joined by his Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, his Secretary and Aide-de-Camp, after which they marched directly to the Market House.

THE AMHERST DINNER TO HOWE AND FULTON.—The following despatch from a friend at Amherst came over the Telegraph wires last night:

To RICHARD NUGENT,—
"Dinner just served. Splendid demonstration. Upwards of three hundred persons present."
The late timely rains have imparted a fresh impetus to vegetation, and all fear for the hay crop, at least, may be considered as set at rest. Vegetables, in both field and garden, present a most thriving appearance, and promise an early and abundant yield. Insects are perpetrating serious depredations on Fruit—the gooseberry and currant, more particular; but this is of minor importance.—*Halifax Sun.*

THE MAGDALEN ISLAND FISHERY.—The following extract from a letter is lying on the New Rooms desk in this city, dated June 15th:—The mackerel fishery has been very unsuccessful—almost a failure. Out of sixty five vessels now in port the largest quantity taken by any one of them does not amount to sixty barrels, and that vessel has not less than sixty nets.

Information reached town on Saturday that the Jury Lists at Amherst had been illegally drawn. Judge Dodd discharged the Jurors—the court rose on Saturday—motions have been made to quash the verdicts already given: and the Label Trials which were to have come off this day are postponed.—*Halifax B. N. American.*

NEW BRUNSWICK.

PROTECTION TO THE FISHERIES.—The schooner Dart, under the command of Lieut. Jenkins, R. N., schooner Bonita, Lieut. Lindsay, R. N., and schooner Alice Rogers, Lieut. Peckell, R. N., have sailed from Halifax for the protection of the fisheries in the Gulf of St. Lawrence. These vessels are officered, manned and armed from the Flag Ship Cumberland.

H. M. Steamship Argus, Commander Purves, left Halifax last Saturday, for the Straits of Belleisle and coast of Labrador, to look after the fisheries here.

The steamer Rose lately chartered by Vice Admiral Seymour, is fitting out at Halifax, and will be stationed on the North side of Prince Edward Island, under the command of Lieut. D-Horsey, R. N.

H. M. Steamer Devastation, Captain Campbell is now cruising somewhere in the Gulf.

SICKNESS AT NEW ORLEANS.—Last week at New Orleans, there were four fatal cases of cholera, and four of yellow fever.

In England a recent act of Parliament has limited all Railroads to a speed of 35 miles an hour, affecting roads which have formerly made sixty or seventy miles.
