

tion, and if not the occupation of the Danubian Provinces, would not necessarily be followed by war. Meanwhile, advices from Trieste state that the French, English and Prussian officers in the Turkish Army were actively engaged in taking measures for defence.

ENGLAND.—In the House of Lords on the 13th inst., in answer to the question of the Marquis of Clanricarde, Earl Clanricarde stated that it was in concert with the French Government that the fleet had been moved up to the neighbourhood of the Dardanelles, and that there was the most cordial understanding between the English and French Governments. Both Governments believed that Constantinople will use the same discretion and moderation on exercising the powers entrusted to them and he hoped that the measure, which was only one of precaution, would insure peace.

A good deal had been said in Parliament relative to the imprisonment of British coloured seamen in South Carolina ports.

The Russian question now seems to have resolved itself into the view which France will ask of Russia into the Tributary Principalities of Turkey, which seems to have been definitely decided upon by Russia in event of her ultimatum being again rejected. It is difficult to conceive how such a step can be taken without being viewed as a declaration of war.

The Government of India Bill was only gone into in the House of Lords.

The Ship Waterloo and Angelica, had arrived from Australia with 74,000 ounces of gold.

Political excitement has not only diminished the prices of public securities, but generally checked the disposition to enter into any financial operations.

Consols have been sold as low as 97½, and closed this evening at 98½.

EGYPT.—Previous to Selomon Pacha's embarkation to Constantinople he had a long interview with the English Consul General.

The Russian Fleet constituted of 23 ships of the line, 8 frigates, 6 corvettes and two small vessels well manned, but the fleet was deficient in steamers.

UNITED STATES.

THE weather in the United States, has been extremely hot. New York papers of Thursday week record sixteen Inquests, principally on the bodies of labourers, who died on Tuesday and Wednesday previous from the effect of the excessive heat while working out of doors.

On this subject the New York Tribune of June 23, contains the following paragraph:

"We don't think of any warmth of expression that will do full justice to such days as the three last. It required a high degree of moral courage to face the thermometer, as the mercury ran up from 80 odds to 93, which last mark was current in our composing room for some time after sunset each day. The weather was truly dreadful, and the effects were painfully visible not only upon the brute but the human creation. There was panting and tanning and gasping on every hand, and longing eyes were turned countryward, and parched tongues babbled of green fields."

It appears that the war steamer Princeton, has been ordered to the fishing grounds.

The New York Herald of the 24th June which we received by Friday's mail, reports eight cases of death by coup de soleil in that city the day previous; two at Williamsburg, six in Brooklyn, one in Jersey City, and two in Baltimore.

RAILWAY NEWS.

We are indebted to the Morning News, for the following Report of the Directors of the North American Railway Company, which was read at the meeting on Saturday the 25th ult.

The Directors Report, that in pursuance of the Resolution passed at the meeting of the Stockholders, holden on the 25th Oct., 1852, Petitions were prepared and forwarded to the Legislature, praying that such alterations, additions and amendments might be made, as should be necessary to carry out the provisions of the contract of the 29th September, entered into between the Company, and Messrs. Jackson, Peto, Brassey and Bets; and such alterations have been made and the contractors are now engaged in locating and constructing that portion of the line, between Shediac and the Bend of the Petitcodiac, which the Directors have reason to believe will be completed, during the present season; and they anticipate that the line from the Bend to St. John will be located before the ensuing winter. The Contractors are prosecuting with vigour, the survey of the route from St. John to the frontier of the State of Maine, which the Directors trust will be finished this summer, and the line determined on.

The Directors have obtained from the Landowners on the line from the Bend to Shediac, concessions of the land on which the line must pass; and the work generally, is proceeding as favourably, under all circumstances, as could reasonably be expected.

The Directors Report is herewith submitted, and from the account it will appear, that with the exception of the small amount of £1457s.3d., expended in securing the right of way, and the trifling sum of £38 10s. 2d. paid for Printing, almost no expenses whatever have been incurred.

The Company now being fairly organised and in successful operation, the Directors trust that its future proceedings will be marked by that energy and economy which have brought it to its present favorable position.
