DISSOLUTION OF THE ASSEMBLY.

THE St. Stephen's Patriot after copying our remarks in reference to the rumour of the intention of the Governor to dissolve the Assembly, makes the following sensible comments:

We agree with the Gleaner, and think it would be well for the people to prepare themselves for the next election—And we quite believe that what "has been currently reported" will occur:—But, why a General Election so prematurely? The people are just beginning to awake! The veil of political ignorance is being removed—The wholesale corruption of the House of Assembly, is causing, even old women and little children to enquire about it. The tale of the "Forty Robbers" in the "Arabian Nights entertainments" has not created more curiosity—nor should it! And is Sir Edmund, about to start the ball in motion so suddenly? Is this to be regarded as a government dodge—a deep trick, a subtle artifice, a profound political ruse to catch the country napping, and hurry on an election before any further information gets a broad? "A strong government could not carry successfully one measure through the House."—There was not one "Government measure brought before the House in 1853 that was worth carrying, through! Not one. Take the greatest, and the best—Attorney General's Street's Election Bill; and was that worth "carrying through? Was it a measure at all? It measured well indeed in length—with its seven chapters, and 16 pages! But, its death was dreadful—and the Affectionate Father of the unwieldy thing, mourned its exit with grief too deep for tears! In a word, should the present House of Assembly be dissolved this summer as is somewhat expected, the people may rely upon the fact, that it is a "government measure" for government purposes, and we warn the country in the words of the "Gleaner"—"prepare for the emergency, and have your candidates selected."

It must be gratifying to every New Brunswicker to see the wide spread notoriety our House of Assembly has obtained for us—the "repudiatory state" is thrown in the back ground, and stand astonished at the superiority of New Brunswick Legislation. Verily we are a great people.

WONDERFUL.—BEATING EVEN AMERICAN LEGISLATORS.—The late New Brunswick Legislature passed what is called the "Contingent Bill." This was to embrace those ordinary expenses attendant on a public body, such as stationery, &c. The members of the Legislature, however, put a most extraordinary construction on the bill, by which they obtained gold pencils, seals, paper, pens, &c., sufficient to last several years. One man, the noblest Roman of them all—as has just come to light, succeeded in making the bill include a whole set of false teeth and a wig. These useful articles cost, in our currency, about \$300. A contingent bill must be a queer affair. Wonder if a member could not clothe his family under its broad provisions?

NEW BRUNSWICK.

RAILWAY PROGRESS.—Letters have been received from Mr Jackson by the last mail which intimates his intention of leaving England with Mr. Robert Stephenson C. E., on Saturday last, in the steamer for Halifax. From thence Mr Jackson will come directly to this Province, accompanied by Mr Stephenson; and Mr Jackson states it to be the full intention of himself and partners, to push on the Railways in New Brunswick as fast as possible; and to complete all of them much sooner than is specified in the contract.

THE FISHERIES.—We learn from Halifax, that in order to ensure uniformity of action, and for the purpose of protecting the fisheries in the most efficient manner, the Executive Government of Nova Scotia has placed the Colonial Cruisers under the command of Vice-Admiral Sir George F. Seymour. The whole Fishery squadron will therefore act under precisely similar orders, and be so disposed at various points as to work harmoniously together, and form a complete coast guard during the fishing season.

There was a large dinner party at Government House, Halifax, last Tuesday evening, in honour of Mr Crampton, who will visit this City in the course of a few days.

The U. S. steamer Princeton will proceed to Halifax, there take in coal, and thence depart for the East Indies, for which station she is destined. The U. S. steamer Fulton is said to be a regular rattle trap, and the American papers express great doubts whether she will ever reach the fishing grounds. The brig-of-war Decatur, under Commodore Shubrick, is probably the only efficient vessel sent on this service.

WOOLEN MANUFACTURES.—If the Americans can make a profit on the wool they purchase in this place, by manufacturing it and selling us the cloth, surely a greater profit can be made by manufacturing it here. They purchase considerable quantities in this County every season, and now they buy sheep and all. We saw a drove on Thursday of about 400, which had been purchased in Jacksontown, and was on its way to Bangor.

We learn that parties are now from Maine for the purchase of horses; This is turning the table, for but a few years ago

our best horses came from that quarter.—Carleton Sentinel.

UNITED STATES.

Oswego papers estimate the loss by the fire on the 5th, at from \$600,000 to \$800,000. Nearly 2000 persons were rendered houseless. A meeting had been held to raise subscriptions for the relief of the destitute.

Six buildings on Staten Island, near quarantine ground, were burnt on Friday.

CANADA.

During the Thunder-Storm on Monday last the lightning entered the office of the Montreal Telegraph Company in this town, and caused serious damage by destroying and melting the Magnet and Wires connected with the telegraphic instruments &c. It was fortunate that McNider, the obliging Operator, was out of the office at the moment, or we might have had the melancholy duty of recording the loss of his life.

The lightning also demolished several of the telegraph poles between this and Cole's Ferry three of them being rent in pieces.—Brookville Recorder.

The Montreal Gazette says that the 26th Regt. is to be replaced by the 54th Regt. now stationed at Kingston, immediately after the Corporal's Inquest has terminated, which had not occurred at our latest advices, this day fortnight. The Jury had been sitting for 3 weeks.

NOVA SCOTIA.

WAR STEAMSHIP MEDEA.—Arrived on Wednesday from the West Indies, and proceeds to Newfoundland to assist off the Vestal, which has got ashore.—British American.

Nine Pottawattamie Indian warriors have arrived at the Crystal Palace, New York, which will be opened this week, with great ceremony.

The Mormons of Malmoe, in Sweden, have been summoned by order of the minister of justice before the capture of Lund to receive a warning; and their chiefs, the priests, are to be prosecuted.

Mr Wise, the aeronaut, thinks that with an expenditure of \$25,000 he can construct a balloon with which he can cross the Atlantic in forty-eight hours.

The dry good merchants of St. John have agreed to receive Nova Scotia coppers in payment for goods.
