Arrival of the Pacific. By Telegraph to the News Room, via Quebec, New York 18th.

The Pacific from Liverpool, 6th April arrived at 2 P. M. on Sunday. In England the Weather was fine. Sales of Bread- stuffs, limited prices tending downwards; 1d on Wheat 3d to 6d per Barrel on Flour. The decline noted since the American sail- ed. Cotton lower from 1-16 to 1-8 of a penny.

Both Houses of Parliament resumed the session on 4th M Delacy Evans gave notice of call for correspondence between Eng- land and France, Spain and United States concerning the alleged Cuba annexation project. In the Lords, Lord Campbell called the attention of the Members to the address recently presented by the London Merchants to the Emperor of France which is as an interference with the prerogative of the Crown and violations of the Laws of Nations. He wished to know if it had the sanction of the Queen's Government. The Earl of Clarendon dissented from Lord Campbell's views and the Earl of Ellen- borough supported them.

A Schooner of about 140 Tons was run down on the night of the 29th ult., off the Isle of Wight, by the Steamer Minerva, all on board were lost.

The Steamer Duke of Southerland, a trader between London and Aberdeen, was wrecked on the 1st instant, in the River Dee, and went to pieces; from 15 to 20 were drowned.

By recent arrivals from Australia very large quantities of Gold had been received.

The difficulties between Switzerland and Piedmont with Austria and Prussia threaten trouble, in the part taken by France, the question is attributed to the refusal of the Pope to visit Paris, for it is now said his Holiness had given a positive refusal.

A Treaty for the mutual extradition of criminals is announced between Prussia and the United States.

Cologne Gazette says—Lord Westmor- land had presented a note to the Austrian Government, declaring that England would keep an eye on Kossuth, Mazzini, and other refugees, to prevent them from enga- ging in any plots, and that if they come within reach of the law they would be pro- secuted. The London Police are said to have prepared a list of all the Refugees in that City.

There has been a fall of snow in Bohemia and blocked up all the Roads.

Attorney General brought in a bill to amend and extend the act relating to Ship- ping Seamen at St. John—read first and second time, after opposition. Mr Robin- son moved the House into Committee on a bill to exempt Railroad plant from local taxation—after discussion, it was postponed. Mr Williston's bill to amend the act for Government of Counties, &c., committed, and postponed. Mr Parrielow read report of Road Committee. Majority recommending appointment of two officers to examine Roads and Bridges, and to report the re- pairs necessary, also an estimate of expen- sences, &c. Also recommended that Su- pervisors be put on salaries. House in sup- ply. The grant for a School in Campbell- ton reconsidered, and rejected. Grants in aid of a Chair Factory in Kingston—re- jected. Grants passed—£12 to buy a farm held by Robert Potts, Richibucto. £500 for the encouragement of the Fisheries. £13 to Duncan Stewart, Gauger, and Weigher at Buctouche. £100 for Sea- men's Hospital at Dalhousie. Bill to es- tablish a Polling place in Northumberland.

Gray's bill to amend the law, committed— progress reported. House adjourned for want of quorum. Yesterday Attorney General stated it was not his intention to press the consideration of the Law Report and Bills, gave notice of motion for printing the whole for distribution.

Fredericton, April 20. — Mr Robinson brought in a bill in amendment of the act to prevent destruction of Cod Fish. A bill to revive the act regulating Herring Fishery, at Grand Manan, &c. Mr Gray—a bill in addi- tion to the act, to provide for the safety of pas- sengers in steamers. Mr Porter a bill to re- gulate the admission of certain persons to practise as Attorneys. House in Committee on a bill to amend the act for collecting of the revenue, repeals the section authorising the Governor to place the trade of New Brun- swick on the footing of coasting trade, de- clared by the despatches to be inconsistent with the Imperial act—passed.

On motion of Mr Botsford a bill to relieve litigations in the Supreme Court from tax- ation, committed. House in Supply. Several School Grants passed—some rejected.

St. John, April 22.

Arabia at New York. On Wednesday evening passed the Canada going into Liverpool, 9th. Wheat 2s. 3d., and Flour is lower; both dull. The Queen has given Birth to a Prince. France quiet. Italy in a very fever- ish state, but not many actual outbreaks. Austria gradually relaxing rigorous treat- ment. The Protestants of Holland had pro- tested against the Catholic Hierarchy in Ger- many. The late outbreaks on the Continent appear to have been connected, and some in- fluential men arrested at Berlin.

Fredericton, April 21.

House met at 9 o'clock. The Bill to amend the Currency Bill, passed Committee; also the Bill to amend and extend the Act, re- gulating the shipping of Seamen at St. John. The Bill repeals the 7th section of the former act, and provides that no one except the Shipping Merchants, shall ship seamen; ex- tends the provision of the Law to all Mer- chant Vessels; also the Bill to amend the Charter of the St. John Presbyterian Church, with sections providing that existing claims, Bonds &c., be not invalidated; no Church is exempted from its operation. Needham, McPherson, and Gordon, asked delay, to allow communication with some parties in St. John. Not granted.

A question was raised whether the Bill sent down from the Council to repeal the 14th section of the Liquor Law, interfered with the privileges of the lower House— reserved for consideration. A bill introduced by Gray for the establishment of Bond Ware- houses for Ship Stores, committed. Progress reported.

CANADA.

THE REVENUE OF CANADA.—The Toron- to Globe publishes the following statement as showing the great increase of the Revenue of Canada from customs duties since 1848.

Gross Receipts for 1848	£334,020
do do 1849	441,547
do do 1850	615,534
do do 1851	735,429

It will thus be seen that the receipts for du- ties in 1851 more than double the receipts of 1848. It is stated also that whilst the expendi- tures of 1848 amounted to £607,355, in 1851 they did not exceed £634,663. Such a steady and extraordinary increase of Revenue with diminished expenditures, would indicate the finances of Canada to be in a healthy and most flourishing condition. We learn further that in 1851 there was a balance of no less than £20,517 at the credit of the consolidated fund. No wonder that Canada debentures are que- ried in London at 115. It is stated by Mr. Hincks that the government will pay off £300,000 of these debentures as they fall due in 1853.

NOVA SCOTIA.

The Industrial Exhibition committee have determined that the proposed exhibition will not be held this year, in consequence of the legislature refusing the necessary aid, and of their failing to raise the amount of £1,000, which was expected to be realized in the coun- ty of Halifax. By reference to our adver- tizing columns it will be seen that His Excel- lency the Lieut. Governor has advertised a public meeting to take place in Halifax on the 27th inst. to consider the best mode of pro- moting the views of the legislature towards getting up a Provincial Agricultural Exhibi- tion to be held in that city, during the ensuing autumn. Many articles in course of prepara- tion for the Industrial Exhibition might under these circumstances be forwarded to the lat- ter.—Pictou Chronicle.

UNITED STATES.

The City of Cambridge, Mass. was asses- sed last year in the sum of \$64,245, which, with the county tax, amounted to \$104,860. Of this sum \$136,260.63 was appropriated to schools, including \$30,000 for the erection of new school houses. The expenditure for the fire department was \$10,796—\$3,000 for a new engine house and engine. The city debt is \$134,500, being an increase of \$18,919 during the year.

ATTACK OF AN EMIGRANT SHIP.—Intel- ligence has been received at Lloyd's, under date, Stanley, Falkland Islands, Jan. 5, of a most daring attack on the ship Porcupine, of Liverpool, Millenger, master, by the Patago- nians. It seems that in passing through the

Straits of Magellan, on her way to California, the Porcupine grounded. Early the next morning the ship was surrounded by nume- rous canoes, full of natives. The captain thinking they might be useful in getting the ship off, let some of the principal chiefs come on deck, when they offered to exchange a copy of 'Johnson's Comprehensive Dic- tionary,' signed on the fly leaf, John Badiam January, 1851, a Prayer book, and other ar- ticles, evidently belonging to an English ship.

The captain, observing a fleet of canoes ap- proaching nearer, many bearing lighted pine branches, gave orders for the crew and pas- sengers, most of whom had revolvers, to arm them- selves, and a most terrific conflict ensu- ed; the savages fought desperately and tried to burn the ship. After a severe struggle and great slaughter, they were beaten off, and 300 bags of oats being thrown overboard, the ship floated. Two of the emigrants, named George Rowell and Henry Boyle, were killed and several others severely wounded. The ship returned to the Falkland Islands, terribly dis- abled.
