PORT OF RICHIBUCTO.

WE take the following extracts from the Pictou Chronicle:

" The London Shipping and Mercantile Gazette of the 25th ult., has a letter signed by twelve shipmasters, calling the attention of shipowners to the condition of the Harbour of Richibucto, New Brunswick, mentioning the loss of a number of ves-sels there in September last, and complain-ing of inacuracy in the charts and sailing directions. They say :-

"It is stated, in the sailing direction book for this coast, the depth of water on the bar is 12½ feet at low water, and 17 feet at high water, spring tides. We find that vessels drawing 12 feet of water have been detained several weeks for want of sufficient water at the bar. The tides are more or less influenced by winds. As the entrance is exposed to heavy gales from the N. E., it has occasioned a decrease in the depth of water, it is extremely dangerous to vessels drawing above 12 feet when loaded, as they must complete their load. ing outside of the bar, riding in an open sea, so that if it blows a N. E. gale a vessel must unavoidably go on shore; it is almost impossible to escape. There are no less than ten wrecks at the entrance of
