And they seem contented to remain in ignorance. Many plead want of time for their inattention to the means of acquiring knowledge, when they spend hour after hour, in idle-ness or toolish gossip with their neigh-bors. A mistaken notion prevails to a bors. It is certainly unwise to be so much engaged in labor as to find no time to road and study. Some time every day should be spent in reading something that will inform and strengthen the mind. And the mind should be trained to habits of thought and study, so that the information picked up here and there, may be appropriated, and result in good to the individual. This is not only a privilege that all may have, but it is a duty that all should preform.
